## Cures Rheumatism.

The London News publishes an  
interesting letter from its special cor-  
respondent in the Sudan, dated Don-  
ough, April 22, giving an account of  
the Mahdi and his movements. The  
correspondent thinks that beyond  
question Mohammed Ahmed is a man  
of considerable intelligence and extra-  
ordinary force of character. In barren  
discussion as to the nature or authori-  
ty of his mission he loses no time. If  
any man be bold enough to challenge  
his divine origin or to express disbelief  
he is permitted to choose between  
submission, open acknowledgement,  
and decapitation. On the other hand,  
he protects and encourages those who  
voluntarily accept him as the true  
Mahdi—the man sent by Allah to re-  
form mankind. He boasts some edu-  
cation, as it is understood in the East;  
that is, he reads and writes, and is  
well versed in the Koran and the com-  
mentaries. He speaks both the Bar-  
bari and Arabic languages. His life  
is simple in the extreme. He indulges  
in none of the luxuries or vanities of  
life, except perhaps a weakness for a  
large number of wives. He is credit-  
ed with possession of thirty-nine of  
these aids to happiness, though the  
orthodox number allowed by the  
Koran is only four. By a system of  
temporary divorce it seems he keeps  
within the letter of the Mohammedan  
law, the ladies taking their turn to be  
divorced and taken on again. The  
Mahdi, the correspondent says, is a  
fighting Prophet. He takes part in all  
the battles and does not spare his own  
person. There is a report current  
that in the fight with Hicks' army he  
received a sword cut across the fore-  
head which divided the brass cap  
which he wears under his turban, and  
inflicted a serious wound. For some  
time after the battle he did not appear  
in public, and it is suspected that  
the wound may have had something to  
do with the extraordinary inaction of the  
Mahdi's forces since the defeat of Gen.  
Hicks. Mohammed Ahmed is "a  
total abstemious man of the purest  
water." Not alone abstemious in  
diet, but in his habits of life. He  
forbids the use of wine and tobacco,  
but even the more harmless enjoyments  
of anathema, and severe penalties in-  
flicted on any one discovered using the  
forbidden luxuries. One of the refugee  
merchants now at Dongola relates that  
having been caught by some of the  
Mahdi's men drinking wine, he was  
beaten, and the wine was seized,  
brought before the Prophet, and sen-  
tenced to receive 150 lashes, which  
were immediately inflicted. Under these  
circumstances it can well be imagin-  
ed, that life in Obed is not gay.

**A NEW OBJECTION URGED AGAINST**  
**THE ACT.**

**ST. JOHN, June 2.—**Prosecutions  
were commenced to day at Sussex  
against six persons charged with sell-  
ing liquor contrary to the Canada  
Temperance Act since the 1st of January,  
1884. Any proceedings since that time  
should be taken under the Liquor  
License Act of 1883. That even as  
early as the 1st of January, 1884, the  
case to the Supreme Court. Among
