Temperance. ENGLAND'S DRINK BILL.-Mr. W Hoyle, in a letter to the London Times points out that the nation's expenditure upon intoxicating liquors during 1883 amounted to \$627,386,375, a decrease of \$3.870,420, as compared with 1882. In 1882 there was a decrease from 1881 of \$4,115.505. In 1860, with a population of 28,778,000, the expendi-ture of the United Kingdom upon intoxicating liquors was \$426,384,350 Year by year the expenditure rose until in 1876 it reached the enormous sum of \$736,443,795. Thus while the population had only grown fitteen per cent., the drink bill had grown seventy-two per cent. Between 1876 and 1880 the drink bill receded from \$736,000,000 to \$610,000,000. This was largely owing to the great depression in trade, and to some extent it was also due to the vigorous efforts of temperance reformers. In 1881 the

drink bill rose again to \$635,000,000, since which year it has fallen to the extent of about \$3,800,000. extent of about \$3,800,000.
