KNOX AUXILIARY.

Rev. Dr. Webster Gave Interesting Address Last Night.

The annual thank offering meeting of Knox Church Auxiliary to the W. F. M. S. was held last evening, when Dr. Webster, of Beirut, Syria, spoke of the condition of women and children in that land. The first missionary work done there was done by a young Scotch woman, Miss Taylor, who from a school of nine Arabic children in 1880 had, in 1904, over 60 pupils, besides a large mothers' class, so the work so unpretentiously begun has left lasting and far-reaching results.

Dr. Webster also spoke of the work of the British Bible Society (undenominational); of the difficulty in getting a foothold in parts of Syria, and of the school's influence in the homes of the Syrians. His own work among the women and children in the hospital was, he said, most interesting and impressive, as illustrated by several experiences.

WHAT HAMILTON ESCAPED.

Hamilton was threatened with a strike to-day which, had it occurred, would have made some of the labor troubles of the past look like a plugged nickel. The telegraph message boys of the G. N. W. talked of quitting. The threatened trouble was over the discharge of one of their number. When one of the "walking delegates" was asked why the strike was not pulled off, he replied, "De felers wouldn't stick."

Mrs. Caroline Knowles, a former resident of this city, passed away at her home in Rochester, N. Y., on Tuesday. Deceased was 82 years of age, and was the relict of Reynolds Knowles.
