THE SITUATION IN IRELAND

DUBLIN, Oct. 28.—A Dublin correspondent says:—The peasant proprietors are likely to prove abortive from want of response from the tenants. No fewer than 400 landlords have intimated that they are willing to sell their estates, but not a single tenant has expressed the wish to buy. No doubt the tenants imagine that under the Land Act they own the land well enough already without going to the expense of buying it. The fifteen Commissioners and their assistants have twice had a conference regarding the arrangements for sub-commissions in the country. It has been decided to commence operations next week in the northern counties. The first interference with the Ladies' League by police took place on Thursday at Ballintra, Donegal, where a head constable stepped in at a meeting and turned the ladies out, warning them not to meet again. The Ladies' League met today at Dublin. It was reported that during the week seven new branches and five children's branches had been formed. Miss Parnell has given notice of a motion to form an association exclusively to attend to the wants of the political prisoners and their families. The Postmaster General has issued a notice to all postmasters, sub-postmasters and post office servants in Ireland warning them against joining the Land League, which had been declared an illegal and unlawful association, and ordering all who may at present be members of the League to sever the connection at once on pain of dismissal. The police have intimated to Mr. Kelly, a spirit and grocery merchant, and proprietor of the Land League offices, in upper Sackville street, that he is in danger of losing his license if he allows his premises to be used any longer by the League. On Thursday Mr. Kelly caused the brass plate to be removed from the door, an I gave notice to the officials of the Ladies' League that they must clear out at once.

DUBLIN, October 31.—Farmers are flocking into the Land Court in increasing numbers every day. Sixteen hundred applied on Friday, 3,600 on Saturday. A staff of clerks is working night and day, yet all are completely swamped. It is in contemplation to appoint more sub-commissioners, as the four now about to sit are inadequate to the labor. It would two years for the present staff to work off the cases, which will probably apply during the coming month.

Archbishop McCabe delivered a pastoral to-day, in which, after referring to the recent scenes of lawlessness which might disgrace an unchristian rabble, he says:—"We feel imperatively called on to enter a most solemn protest against another indignity which has been offered to the moral sense of our people in this city. Only a few days ago overconfident men were startled from the dream of security by the publication of a manifesto which assailed the eternal law of God and struck at the foundation on which society rests. WENDELL PHILLIPS ON IRELAND.

New York, Nov. 4.—In reply to an invitation from officers of the Land League to visit Ireland and advocate their cause, as representative of America, Mr. Wendell Phillips has written a letter, declining on account of ill health, but expressing warm encouragement. He says: "We have a right to infer, from England's insolence and brutality, in word and act, that she seeks to provoke Ireland to violence, and thus get an excuse for military occupation of the island. It is infinitely important that Ireland should be aware of this plot, and by serene forbearance defeat it. At the same time it is equally important for the sake of civil liberty that Ireland, with united front and courage never to submit or yield, should defend the citadel of personal freedom and civilization. Success is sure. To doubt it were to doubt the world's progress and the rule of a just God."
