Last Saturday morning a large crowd had gathered about the place de la

Roquette in the expectance of seeing these people executed, but the execution was postponed on account of the marriage o the executioneer, Deibler's son and assistant, to the daughter of a provincial executioneer. Since that time, Sunday morning excepted, low women and their consorts as well as a certain number of people

of the better class have gathered each morning about the prison and execution place, singing, shouting, fighting and using obscene and profane language. This morning the crowds' were more riotous and offensive than usual. The conse quence was that the police were compelled to charge the crowds, making many arrests and somewhat clearing the air of the neighborhood. The gargottes, cafes and other public resorts of the neighborhood have throughout the week been doing a booming business as a result of this bloodthirsty expectancy and when the police had charged and cleared the streets the officers had another and quite a lively task in clearing out the most disorderly of these drinking places. Here again many arrests were made and hideous drunken men and drink-sodden women

yelling and fighting, were escorted to the police stations, soiling the very air by their horrible language. THIS MAN HAD EIGHT WIVES




