Broken Pledge.

On April 10th, 1909, some two and a half years ago, the leader of the so-called People's Party, but now better known as the People's Party, made the following promise over his own signature. We quote what Sir Edward Morris wrote word for word:—"During the past three years the sealing steamers Greenland, Walrus, Grand Lake, Panther and Virginia Lake have been lost the seal fishery, with the owner's share of the catch on board or the prospects of a catch, insured, and the seal fishery has been uninsured, leaving the men to endure great hardship and suffering as well as the fruits of their perilous pursuit. It ought not to be difficult to devise a plan whereby in future, if such should occur, the men would stand on the same footing as the owners. I shall be glad, ere the next seal fishery begins, to take up this matter in the same spirit."

At the time Sir Edward Morris made this promise in writing over his own signature, he was Prime Minister. Since that time he has spent more than two and a half years in charge of the Administration, and within that time has held Three Sessions of the Legislature, and has failed absolutely to evolve a plan which he declares can be done with ease. Although he has spent considerable time picking about and much time picking at home, he has had surely time enough to do for the sealers what he promised to do before the spring of 1910.

Had Terrific Time.

The schr. Bessie R. Capt. Moore, which arrived here Monday afternoon from Great Crowm Arny lumber laden, had a terrible time in the storm of Saturday night and Sunday last. She left Change Islands Friday evening and at 9 Saturday night was overtaken by a S. E. gale with a mountainous sea. The vessel ran off the land under short canvas, as it began to drift heavily, and while laying to Sunday at 2 a.m. under a single reefed foresail, the lumber on deck shifted and seas began to make a clean breach over her. The cargo beat the bulwarks off her on the port side, smashed her stanchions and split the cutwater. Shortly before daylight the vessel started to run again, but had to leave to, when a big sea again came on board, took the water casks, beef and pork cask out of their lashings and swept them overboard, while 50,000 feet of lumber, the whole deck cargo, worth \$1,000, went overboard. From Sunday morning until she arrived here Monday evening the men had no water to drink and very little food. They will never forget the terrible experience they had.

Pretorian in Port

HAD STORMY TRIP—SUICIDE ON THE TRIP ACROSS.

The Allan Liner Pretorian, Capt. B. Henry, arrived here from Liverpool, at 12.35 p.m. to-day after an exceedingly stormy run. She left Liverpool Tuesday week, and the first 5 days out the weather was fine but after that it was a continuation of gales with head winds and sea and the big vessel in laboring in the sea lost one blade of her propeller considerably retarding her speed. She brought 660 tons cargo, 3 baskets and 7 bags mail and these passengers:—Saloon—Miss M. Foran, Mr. James P. Howley, Miss E. Storr and Mr. Charles H. Transfield; in second cabin—Mrs. W. R. Burnett, Mr. H. House, Mr. A. Marcussen, Mr. W. A. Pyres, Mr. F. Seymour, Jr. with 5 seamen of the Renown in steerage. On her voyage to Glasgow an assistant steward named Proudfoot committed suicide by jumping overboard. He left a note behind saying he intended the deed. His rash act occurred just after dinner and was witnessed by none of the crew.
