Can you laugh? Just about once in so often I am newly impressed with the enormous value of a good laugh as a social asset.

My most recent lesson in this matter was given me by one of those mushroom acquaintances which we all make in vacation days. She was a rather plain woman with no particular recommendation except that ability to laugh, often, at the proper time, and extremely well. And by "well" I don't mean musically, but simply with an appearance of hearty enjoyment and appreciation.

Now I am sure some of my readers are wondering what I mean by praising such a woman. Perhaps they are saying, "I wouldn't be such a hypocrite for anything."

Nobody wants you to be a hypocrite, my friends.

And I am not praising the woman. I am simply praising the laugh.

I am taking it for granted that you are one of the genuinely cordial folks, and, therefore, I urge that you learn to laugh as a self-expression, not as a pretense.

Household Notes.

A piece of fine sandpaper makes a very good ink eraser.

To keep lemon juice, cover them with cold water, changing it every week.

Equal parts of glycerine and carbolic acid are the best cure for itchy poison.

If you have difficulty in making your jellies, add a pinch of powdered alum.

Never put knives with ivory handles in water. Hot water makes them crack and discolor.

If there is any cream of wheat left over fry it as you would cornmeal mush. It is very good.

If a vase is top-heavy when you put flowers in it, put sand or shot in the bottom.

Creaking doors and drawers should be rubbed with hard soap. It is much better than greasing.

A broom should never be put away

standing on the brush part. Put it in a corner with its brush up.

Books can be saved from mold if a few drops of oil of lavender are put here and there through the bookcase, paper as soon as it comes from the market, otherwise the paper absorbs the juices.

When washing cut or pressed glass use a stiff little brush. You will be surprised.

Odds and ends of toilet soap should be saved and melted all together into one cake, which can be used in the kitchen.

A mixture of olive oil and lime water in equal quantities makes a very good remedy for a burn. Turpentine is also good.

When you have fresh fruit left open after a meal, can it at once. You will be surprised next winter to see how much preserves you have.

In marketing always remember that it is most economical to buy the best and freshest produce, because there is less waste in using it.

The dust can be gathered very easily from matting on bare floors by pinning a cloth over the broom and going over the dusty surface.

Before using a new broom tie the straws together, put into a pail of boiling water, soak two hours and dry thoroughly before using.

When preparing chicken for home use dip it in a pail of boiling water before picking it. The feathers will come off very quickly and easily.

If you are cooking a round steak first beat it. Use a small hammer or any blunt thing. The beating breaks the fibre and the steak is less tough.

If the porcelain bathtub is difficult to make clean and white, put a little kerosene oil on the cloth; it will clean off the soil with the utmost ease.

To cleanse articles made of white zephyr rub in flour and magnesia, changing it very often. Shake off the flour and hang the article in the sun.

When the tablecloth has a spot here and there and you are not ready to change it, run magnesia on the spots; the cloth will look much cleaner.

When canning fruit always be sure that the rubbers are new and fresh. Old or dead rubbers will not keep the jars airtight, and the fruit will spoil.

Oilcloth should never be washed with soapy water. Soap is apt to spoil the color. Use lukewarm water with a few drops of ammonia in it and a soft cloth.

The Japanese printed tablecloths, dollies and centrepieces simplify the problem of table laundry in the summer time. They need no starching and are easily ironed.

Something new in the shops—jelly cups of paraffine paper with a lid which fits perfectly tight. They can be washed with soap and water and used a second time.

In cleaning woodwork painted white, always moisten the lower part first, otherwise there is danger of soiled water running down on the dry paint and making a stain.

A novel idea for serving the sandwiches at afternoon tea is the Japanese sandwich basket of brown bamboo, with top and side handles. Each basket holds a plate.

If the sink drain chances to get choked don't send for a plumber at once, but pour into the sink one-fourth pound copperas dissolved in two quarts of boiling water.

To remove iron rust from linen use lemon juice and salt and bleach the linen in the sun. If it is not removed with one application repeat it until the rust has disappeared.

When washbasins are put away after washing they should have two or three inches of water in them, or they are apt to leak when you next use them.

A nourishing and pleasant drink can be made for the invalid by beating the white of an egg just enough to make it froth, then add the juice of an orange and a little sugar and cracked ice.

The Motor Boat.

The motor boat is a series of short-haired explosions entirely surrounded by snell.

The result is that all the conversation carried on aboard a motor boat while it is in a state of eruption is borrowed from the sign language of a deaf and dumb home.

Motor boats are built for the purpose of hitting the high spots in the briny deep on the principle of the Swedish pole vault. The speed of one of these boats depends to a large extent upon whether the skipper is full or only half full.

The motive power of a motor boat consists of 18-cent gasoline mixed with ripe profanity, which makes one of the most stuttfest and odorous combinations in the annals of any people.

The motor boat which comes in contact with the water when under full speed is considered a melancholy failure. The late models run on the keel in a perpendicular position, giving the passenger the soothing sensation of riding a Montana mustang with the bridle off.

The most pleasing feature of the motor boat is the exhaust, which is a cross between a cannon firecracker and the crack of doom. It explodes with increasing energy and opens yawning crevices in the ear drums of the innocent bystander. In all other respects the motor boat makes an ideal Christmas present.

Rose Gave the Names.

To District Attorney of the Gamblers Who Contributed Large Sums of Money to New York Police—Tells Of Methods Employed by Police to Get Money.

New York, August 6.—"Bald Jack" Rose, the gambler upon whose testimony was chiefly based the indictment of Police Lt. Chas. Becker, on the charge of instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal to-day furnished District Attorney Whitman with a written statement disclosing in detail the history of his relations with Becker, as one of the police officer's alleged graft collectors.

Rose, in his confessions, reiterated his previous allegation that Becker was one of four high police officers who collected between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000 yearly from illegal resorts, and gives a complete table of his collections from gamblers which he says he turned over to Becker. These collections, according to the "confession" averaged from \$12,000 to \$15,000 a month, and came from a dozen or more gambling houses.

The names of about ten of them, Rose gave to the District Attorney. Becker, he said, was continually hounding him for more money, telling him that "the bunch down town isn't getting enough."

Rose's statement covered thirty pages of finely written note paper. The gambler had been working on it in his cell ever since on the promise of leniency. District Attorney Whitman got him a week ago to make his first confession of his part in the plot to assassinate Herman Rosenthal as the latter was about to give evidence involving Becker in gambling graft.

Rose declared that he had always turned his collections over to Becker in cash and frequently at Rose's home, and that his wife and servants had seen the money pass and could testify to the truth of his statement.

Becker's method of bringing the gamblers to terms was to raid them first, Rose said. This was the police officers' way, he explained, of "getting acquainted." After the raid, he would offer to "fix the case" before the unfortunate gambler would "come across." If he did then Becker's men, he said, would give harmless evidence before the jury or "forget."

BATTLE WITH MAN-EATING SHARK.

New York, Aug. 6.—A man-eating shark, 12 feet long, and weighing nearly 400 pounds, gave the ten men on board the fish schooner Tansy Bitters, the greatest excitement in their fishing career off Sandy Hook today. The huge shark was caught in the meshes of a seine. When it was finally landed it flopped about so that more than half of the crew were knocked to the deck time and again. The men rushed at the monster with large sheath knives and after they had stabbed it a score of times the shark succumbed. It is the first monster of its kind to be seen in these waters for many years.
