

**BENEFIT FOR ICEMEN.**—The ice men at the Prince's Rink will have a benefit night on Monday night next. For this object a number of the best city hockeyists are arranging for a match to take place.

**BROUGHT IN PRISONER.**—To-day Const. Morrissey brought over John McCurdy, who was convicted Monday at Bell Island and fined \$50 or one month. He preferred to spend the time in prison to paying the fine.

**BROKE HIS ARM.**—Last night while passing up Water Street a seaman named Jensen, belonging to the barque Ada Peard, met with a painful accident. He slipped and fell on the concrete sidewalk, breaking his left arm. Dr. O'Connell set the broken limb.

**ANOTHER DROWNING.**—The Sub-Collector at Odein wired the accompanying message to Deputy Minister of Customs, LeFevrier: "Wm. Barron, of St. Joseph's, arrived here yesterday from St. Pierre. Reports one of his crew named Thos. Whelan drowned at St. Pierre. Body recovered." No further particulars as to the happening was received.

**STEEL BRIDGE.**—We learn from Mayor Ellis that a steel draw bridge will replace the bridge now being put down where the Long Bridge stood. It will be commenced during the early summer and will be finished in October. The water under the bridge west of it will be dredged and the Calypso, now much in the way where she is, will be removed west of the draw bridge.

**To-Day's News.**

**SALONIKA, To-day.**

The assassin of King George was a Greek of low mentality, named Aleko Schines. He shot the King through the heart. The King was accompanied only by an Aide de Camp. The assassin came suddenly upon him and fired one shot from his revolver. The tragedy caused intense excitement. Schines was seized immediately and overpowered. The wounded King was lifted into a carriage and taken to hospital. He was still breathing, but died within half an hour. Crown Prince Constantine, who succeeds King George, is at present at Janina. He is expected to come here with all possible speed. The assassin of the King is an evil looking fellow, about forty years old. Upon being arrested he refused to explain his motive for the crime. He declared his name was Aleko Schines, and in reply to a question asked him whether he had no pity for his country, answered that he was against Governments. Schines maintained a peremptory, massive demeanor which was suggestive of his being a desperado for his actions. When Prince Nicholas bade the officers to swear fealty to King Constantine, they shouted "Long live the King." Prince Nicholas is the only member of the Royal Family in Saloniki. Mourning emblems are displayed everywhere. The Greek Government has issued a proclamation announcing that the oath of fealty to King Constantine has been taken.

**LONDON, To-day.**

The greatest sympathy is felt for Queen Mother Alexandra, as King George of Greece was her favorite brother. She only recently suffered another, although less tragic blow in the death of her brother King Frederick of Denmark. Princess Victoria broke the news to her, and because of uncertainty she was able to hope that the report was not true, but it was soon confirmed by an official despatch. Queen Alexandra is said to be prostrated. King George and Queen Mary will come from Windsor in the morning and give what consolation they can. Even if the King of Greece's close relationship with the British Royal Family did not exist, the circumstances of his death would debar the Court for a time from social functions. It is expected that the Court mourning will be announced for three months, and that all official engagements except the most necessary ones will be cancelled. It is expected the body of the murdered King will be taken to Athens aboard a warship for burial. He went to Saloniki immediately after occupation and remained there in the capacity of Commander-in-Chief. King George was a frequent visitor to London, his last visit being on the occasion of King Edward's funeral when he met Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and became exceedingly friendly with the ex-President whom he impressed as one of the most democratic characters among the European Sovereigns assembled here. He remained as a guest at Buckingham Palace for several days with his brother, King Frederick of Denmark, and walked about the streets entirely unattended and unrecognized. Several times they joined crowds which gathered in front of the Palace to cheer the new English King, their shouts being unobserved by the working men with whom they rubbed elbows.

**PARIS, To-day.**

Deaf to the eloquent arguments of the French Premier Aristide Briand, embodied what is pronounced the finest speech in his career in the Senate last night in the overthrow movement on the question of proportional representation. The Chamber of Deputies had already passed this measure by 229 to 217, practically the whole country are keen clamouring for political re-arrangement as provided by this Bill. The only solution seemingly open is for President Poincare to dissolve the Chamber, but as any election would be made on a question of proportional representation the new Chamber would be just as much at loggerheads with the Senate as ever. Certain politicians declare the campaign against proportional representation which was led by ex-Premier Clemenceau was really directed against President Poincare in the hope that the situation would become so impossible that no other course would be left open to him but to resign the Presidency. Speculation is rife as to Briand's successor. Belleville probably will be the Minister of War. Eugene Etienne, will be offered the Premiership as it is desired to avoid delay in the passage of new military measures.
