YOUR BOYS AND GIRLS

The crib of a child after babyhood should be furnished with a pas or blanket between sheet and mattress. Both sheets and pillow slips should be untrimmed save for a monogram or a bit of cross stitch in colors, if liked. The soft woolly blankets in checkerboard design are very attractive, especially in creamy white and

wood brown. A dull blue combined with tan is also very effective.

Blankets on this order do not soil as quickly as white ones, and the checkerboard is a great improvement over the old-time grey and red blankets with their ugly black borders.

The spread can be made at home. A soft cotton poplin in a shade of pale tan, decorated with cut out animals, little folks and landscapes are all appropriate. A good plain trimming for sheets consists of three bands of satin in a fast color, each cut a little narrower than the other and set on a few inches apart as a border. Another way is to set a motif in the center and edge with a fairly wide band.

In the election in the Merthyr-Tydfil constituency on Nov. 26th to choose a successor to the late James Keir Hardie, leader of the Independent Labor Party, Mr. Stanton, the unofficial labor candidate, received 10,236 votes against 6,080 cast for Winston, the official Labor candidate. Although both candidates are opposed to a premature peace and insist that the war be fought to a finish, Mr. Stanton took a vigorous attitude on behalf of conscription. On this subject, he said,

"If the Government tells the country there must be conscription I shall vote for it and vote to double the conscription, if necessary." Mr. Winston whose son is in the army, avowed his determination to support the war to the end, but declared himself absolutely opposed to compulsory service.
