**The South African Miracle.**

(From the London Chronicle.) General Botha left our shores yesterday. If our countrymen who were killing President Kruger with their mouths some twenty years ago had been asleep in the meantime and had awakened to read this intelligence, they might have concluded that General Botha was returning to his own country in accordance with an amnesty for prisoners of war. Would they have believed the miracle that one of the ablest of our former enemies in arms had come to Europe and was again leaving Europe, as the Prime Minister of a British South Africa? Surely they would have been the more credulous when they learned that the Government in power in Britain at the time of the miracle included statesmen who had declared that the Boer control of South Africa, or even of the Transvaal and the Orange River Colony, would be tantamount to British surrender. Do we recall the contrast of the ignominy of the Boer General and his countrymen in Great Britain 20 years ago, and the respectful tribute which is universally paid to him and them today in order to discredit further our intransigents? Is it our object to imply that the astonishing transformation which we now witness in British and Boer relations is due alone or principally to British magnanimity and British genius for reconciling apparent incompatibles? By no means. Common sense has prevailed over passion on both sides, and British and Dutch alike in South Africa have recognized that neither race can exist there under any conditions of comfort without co-operation. Lord French, the other day, described the Boers as the most chivalrous enemies we had ever fought, and since then we have learnt that they are also the most reliable friends. We look from South Africa to Ireland with renewed hope. It is clearly not impossible that we may yet see Mr. de Valera himself acclaimed in London as the first Prime Minister of a contented Ireland.
