

## To-day's Messages.

THE MENACE OF RACE SUICIDE.

LONDON, Oct. 12.  
(Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Sir  
Rider Haggard, giving evidence be-  
fore the national Birthrate Commis-  
sion yesterday, dwelt on the dangers  
of artificially keeping down births,  
which was now widespread in every  
Western Nation except, he said, per-  
haps Russia and Germany. He said  
he was of the opinion that, unless a  
startling change happened, the West-  
ern races within the next two cen-  
turies should be submerged beneath a  
great influx from the teeming my-  
riads of the East. He doubted the ef-  
fectiveness of appealing to the con-  
science of the Empire to stop this race  
suicide, but thought the state might  
stamp out disease tending to sterilize  
the race and also subsidize mother-  
hood and as a desperate last resort,  
the state could directly or indirectly  
bring up all children, even holding out  
a kind hand to those not born in wed-  
lock.

## TRANSCONTINENTAL FLIGHT AC- COMPLISHED.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.  
First Lieutenant B. W. Maynard,  
piloting a Haviland aeroplane, one of  
the west bound fliers in the transcon-  
tinental air derby, arrived in San  
Francisco from Mineola at 11.30 p.m.  
to-day.

BINGHAMPTON, N.Y., Oct. 11.  
Major Carlpatz, flying from San  
Francisco to Mineola, reached Bing-  
hampton from Rochester at 2.51 p.m.  
It is raining, and weather permitting  
he will leave for Mineola at 4 p.m.

## JELICOE IN FIJI ISLANDS.

SUVA, Fiji Islands, Oct. 5.  
(Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Admiral  
Lord Jellicoe on his arrival here  
was met by a fleet of sailing canoes  
and welcomed by the native chiefs.  
In a speech he suggested that this  
would probably be the Pacific naval  
base.

## AUSTRALIA'S FINANCIAL CONDI- TION.

MELBOURNE, Aus., Oct. 8.  
(Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—In the  
Federal House of Representatives,  
Hon. Mr. Poynten, Minister without  
portfolio, in introducing the budget,  
said that the total revenue for 1919-  
20 was \$44,475,000. The expendi-  
ture was over \$45,000,000, of which  
\$21,025,000 was due to the war. The  
total war expenditure was nearly  
\$311,500,000, of which \$46,000,000  
was paid out of revenue. The esti-  
mated deficit for 1919-20 is \$3,280,  
000. The public debt of the Common-  
wealth and States amounts to nearly  
\$708,000,000. Mr. Poynten announced  
that there would be new taxation,  
but old age and invalid pensions  
would be increased from 12/- to 18/-  
weekly. The government ship-  
ping programme provides for twenty  
steamers of 6,000 tons, of which three  
have been launched, and four vessels  
of three thousand tons, which are be-  
ing built. The Australian Govern-  
ment, he said, has contracted to have  
five steamers of 12,000 tons construct-  
ed in England. The net earnings of  
the Commonwealth Line amounted to  
\$3,500,000.

## THE PRINCE'S "AU REVOIR."

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 12.  
"I shall not say good-bye to West-  
ern Canada, but only au revoir." The  
Prince of Wales closed his tour of  
Western Canada here yesterday with  
these words at the end of a luncheon  
at which he entertained two hundred  
and thirty guests from all parts of  
the West. In his simple speech the  
Prince of Wales expressed his affec-  
tion for Western Canada and his  
people; his admiration for the spirit  
of the land, and his determination  
to come again when the circumstan-  
ces should permit. Simplicity and  
earnestness were in the Prince's  
words, and when he sat down his  
guests broke out in a great roar of  
applause and encouragement. "I  
think this Western spirit must be  
very catching," the Prince said in the  
course of his speech. "At least, I  
know I've caught it badly. I feel so  
much at home here by this time that  
I want to have a permanent home  
amongst the people of the West, a  
place where I can come sometimes  
for a while. To this end I recently  
purchased a small ranch in Southern  
Alberta and I shall look forward to  
developing it and making it my  
own."
