The provocative note sent by Ausria to Serbia was warmly applauded: 'Bravo! We had not thought that the Viennese were still capable of that!" Austria, according to Count Berchtold, did not desire any displacement of the balance of power in the Balkans. But Wilhelm would have nothing to do with such weakness. "Austria," he wrote, "must have the preponderance of power in the Balkans . and she must have it at Russia's

The Czar's proposal to refer the lispute between Austria and Serbia The Hague was denounced as

"A Low Cur." When Lord Grey mildly suggested that the Austrian demands might perhaps be modified, the apologist of the right divine of kings wrote: "It is not his duty to judge these demands; that is the affair of His Majesty Franz Joseph." Serbia was "a band of robbers." Grey must be told that "I stand no trifling." Lichnowsky re ported that the British Government feared the danger of a European war if Austria entered Serbia, and Wilhelm added the immensely significant comment: "This will certainly hap-
