every death claim and leave a balance at  
the end of the year of 71,636.23. It is a  
question if there is another organization in  
existence, that gives a more detailed state-  
ment of all transactions than that given by  
the officers of the A.O.U.W. The follow-  
ing facts will be of interest to every mem-  
ber of the order. Members initiated in  
1901, 48,49, average age of new members 29  
years. There were 29 new lodges organized  
Total lodges in Ontario 449. The reserve  
fund is \$226,345. Paid in death claims in  
1901, \$6,529,108. In dealing with the pro-  
posed amendments to the constitution it  
was decided not to admit women, not to  
start a sick benefit branch. Not to change  
the rates this year, not to longer debar  
residents of the Yukon, not to make an  
extra call for the reserve fund, not to  
start a fund for aged and in-  
firm members, and not to issue \$3000 or  
\$4000 certificates. It was decided in future  
to hold the annual session the third week  
in March, and to hold the next grand lodge  
in Toronto.
