THE DAY'S DOINGS

Chronicle in Concise But Comprehensive Form.

A Life-Saver Pulled Under by a Shark—End of the Great Strike in Wales.

Lord Stanley will formally open the Cape Breton Railway next month.

Messrs. McCullough, Houston & Co., Toronto, are offering their creditors 60 cents on the dollar.

Thirteen carloads of pilgrims from Glen Falls arrived at Quebec on Wednesday, mostly en route to St. Anne.

The tug Annie Watt was sunk by collision with the steamer Alderson near Barrier Island, Georgian Bay. No lives lost.

C. P. Moore, Hamilton, got his hand mangled in a buzz saw, and the back of his head was badly cut, three tendons being severed.

The steam derrick at the Adjuca quarry, near Brampton, fell over Thursday morning, instantly killing a man named Murphy and a horse.

The proposal of the Capuchin Order to establish a monastery at Ottawa is due to their desire to escape the operations of the military law in France.

The Council of the Dominion Alliance met in Montreal yesterday, and the Royal Templars of Temperance took up their quarters in camp in the same city.

Chief Constable England, of Brampton, arrested George Brett at Milton on a charge of having attempted an outrage on Mrs. Dick. The information was laid by the woman's husband.

Miss Kerkela, music teacher, of Bowmansville, who was visiting friends in West Toronto Junction, became suddenly ill while being driven from Toronto, and died by the bursting of a blood vessel.

The Dominion Government will investigate the complaint of the Canadian Indians at Lake of the Woods, who complain that American fishermen threaten the extermination of fish by wholesale slaughter.

The Provincial Natural Gas Company, according to Government advisers, has struck another natural gas well in Welland county, Ontario. It has a capacity of 9,000,000 cubic feet per day.

Patrick Sullivan, son of Patrick Sullivan, 75-year-old, Hamilton, left a week ago to seek employment in the States. Information has been received that young Sullivan was killed at Tyrone, Pa., while trying to board a moving train.

The Hamilton and Dundas street railway train, while entering Hamilton on Thursday, collided with the delivery wagon belonging to Jas. Osborne & Son. Wm. Evans, the driver, was thrown out, and received severe injuries to his legs and feet.

A dispatch from Detroit says: "Percy Kerr, of Hamilton, Ont., was leaning over the side of the steamer Canada, just as she was leaving the dock at the foot of Bait street, when one of the fenders broke. Kerr was struck on the head and seriously injured."

At last evening's meeting of the Teachers' Convention at Niagara the Minister of Education delivered an address dealing with many important subjects. At the various sittings yesterday the text-book, professional training and other questions were considered.

Fatal riots have occurred at the Shelby Iron Works, near Birmingham, Ala.

A Paris, Ky., dispatch says the amount of Hume Clay's forgeries is now estimated at over \$100,000.

Wm. Kilbriest, aged 20 years, a life saver doing duty at Rockaway Beach, was drowned Wednesday. It is thought he was pulled under by a shark. Fishermen have noticed an unusual number of sharks off Rockaway Beach of late.

The platform of the Democratic State Convention of West Virginia declares in favor of free coinage of silver, and arraigns the Republican party for the McKinley Bill, the Force Bill, and the extravagance of the National Administration.

Resolutions adopted by the Farmers' Alliance of Kansas demand hours for laborers, equal distribution of lands for homesteads, the passage by Congress of a service pension law, the equalizing of paper money on gold values, the payment of ex-prisoners of war for the time spent in confinement, and a national arbitration law.

An explosion occurred Thursday, at Providence, R. I., in the Kindall Manufacturing Company's large soap factory, corner of Page and Friendship streets. There were 70 persons at work there, and of these ten were taken to the hospital badly injured. Richard Carroll, 35 years old, and John McElroy, aged 27, were probably fatally injured.

Fred L. Hurlbert, aged 35, of Buffalo, and Miss Florence Sullivan, of Brooklyn, were drowned Thursday afternoon while bathing in the sea opposite the Moanmouth House, in Spring Lake, Asbury, N. J. They had gone up the beach 100 yards, intending to swim down to the grounds. Both were seized by the current known as the "sea push" and rapidly borne out to sea. E. Mitchell and George E. Matthews and Emil Fritsch were brought ashore unconscious.

A trust, to monopolize the trade in chemicals, has been formed at Paris with a capital of \$40,000,000.

Emperor William has started for Kiel. He took with him a grand hunting dog named Prince Bismarck, in the course of an interview declared he maintained now the views and principles he held while in office.

The discontent prevailing among the home regiments has spread to Ireland, and it is feared that an attempt will be made to raise a rebellion in the near future. The demand for an official investigation of the causes of the trouble and redress of the grievances of the men is increasing.

A Great Oil Gusher.

FINDLAY, Ohio, Aug. 15.—Yesterday morning an oil well was drilled just north of the city, which flowed over 1,000 barrels the first hour, and up to 6 o'clock last evening the production was 6,340 barrels, the first flow beginning at 11 o'clock. This breaks the record of oil wells in Ohio, if not in the world.

Given Up for Lost.

HALIFAX, Aug. 15.—On the 4th of August the schooner Richard Thompson, Capt. Joseph O. Green, left Pictou for Summerside, P. E. I., with a cargo of coal and a deck-load of empty oil barrels. Since then nothing has been heard of vessel or crew. The voyage is ordinarily made in about three or four days, with a fair wind. Besides the captain, there were on board John Richard, of Summerside, a Frenchman, name unknown, and a young man named Reeves, of Summerside, a passenger.

A Death-Dealing Torrent.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 15.—A cold burst occurred in this city and vicinity yesterday afternoon. Two lives were lost, and it is feared a family who were camping were lost also. Roads were beaten down, and the water and hail were so heavy that the ground was underlaid by the water and hail. An unknown Swede who lived in the flats below the town was swept away, and a woman who resided among the poor, who went down toward the creek cannot be found. Twelve miles of railroad tracks were washed away on the Midland, and all trains are delayed. The drift of the storm was 25 minutes, and its path was a mile wide. The damage is at least \$200,000.
