Brave Men Butchered New York's

Sensation!

Britain's Policy,

Remarkable Turn Taken in the

Guldensuppe Murder Trial.

Mrs. NACK, the Accomplice of Thorn, Turns State's Evidence.

Story Told by the Accused Woman on the Witness Stand-Says Thorn Shot Guldensuppe-Doesn't Know What Became of the Head.

Long Island City, N. Y., Nov. 10.-Martin Thorn was exceptionally cheer-
ful yesterday, and seems to share
with his lawyers confidence in the
jurymen. District Attorney Youngs
said that after he had presented the
case, he would produce as the first
witnesses the persons who found the
several parts of the body in the order
that they were picked up.

Lawyer Howe requested the court to
exclude all the witnesses in the case
from the courtroom, with the excep-
tion of the medical experts. The court
so ordered.

John McGuire was then called and
described the finding of the bundle by
his companion McKenna, and how he
cut open the bundle and found the
upper portion of a body with a piece
about eight inches square cut off the
breast. The witness then identified that
piece of cloth produced in court, and
also a photograph of the portion of the
body.

James McKenna corroborated McGuire
in every detail.

New York, Nov. 10.-A sensation was
created this morning when the public
was informed through the morning
newspapers that Mrs. Augusta NACK
had turned state's evidence, and in a
confession which she made through her
lawyer, Emanuel Friend, for the bene-
fit of the prosecution, she had fastened
the crime of the horrible murder and
subsequent mutilation of the body of
the victim on her lover, Martin Thorn.

Reporters tried in vain to gain
an interview with the accused prisoners.
At 8:45, Lawyer Wm. F. Howe was
seen by a representative of the Asso-
ciated Press. "It is a fact, Mr. Howe,"
that Mrs. NACK has made a confession,"
he was asked. "I don't know,"
he replied. "All I do know is the news
which I received from Mr. Friend last
night. Thank God," he exclaimed, "I
never did such a thing, and I have been
practising for 32 years as a lawyer."

"Did what, Mr. Howe?" asked the
reporter. "Allow a client to confess,
that is what I have been doing. I have
never known where was absolutely no
testimony."

IN THE COURTROOM.
Judge Smith, accompanied by Dis-
trict Attorney Walter Jay Cox, of
Suffolk county, took his seat on the
bench at 9:30 o'clock, and a few min-
utes later Thorn, handcuffed to Capt.
McGuire, came in and shook hands
with his counsel. The latter informed
the prisoner, for the first time, of the
confession of Mrs. NACK, and Thorn's
great natural indignation was shown
in a copy of a morning paper bearing a
large headline, which read: "Mrs.
NACK has turned state's evidence."
Thorn glanced at it intently, and then
handed the paper back.

Mrs. NACK entered the court-
room, escorted by her lawyer and
Deputy Sheriff Bebragga, and a mo-
ment later she was called to the wit-
ness stand. To do this she had to
walk within a foot of Thorn, but she
did not look at him. Judge Weller be-
gan the direct examination of the wo-
man as soon as she was seated in the
witness chair. She began by telling
her name, age and where she was born,
and by degrees was led up to the
fact that she had left her husband
and was living with Guldensuppe at
439 Ninth avenue. Then she was led
up to the morning of Friday, June
25, the day that the crime was com-
mitted.

Mrs. NACK said she and Guldensuppe
left New York between 9 and 10 o'clock
that morning, after they had crossed
the ferry they boarded a trolley car,
which left them at the Woodside cot-
tage. "I had the key of the house,"
she said, "and I opened the front door."
I told Guldensuppe to enter and exam-
ine the house, while I went into the
yard. He went upstairs, and I heard
a shot. Martin Thorn then came run-
ning down, and when he met me he
said:

"I'VE SHOT HIM-HE IS DEAD."
He was very excited and I was half-
dead. He said the self-confessed murder-
er, breathlessly.

"What did you do then?" asked Judge
Weller.

"I told me to go home and come
back at 5 o'clock. When I came back
that evening Thorn had everything
packed up in bundles. He handed me
a bundle which he said contained Gul-
densuppe's clothes; he took another
bundle which was wrapped up in gray
colored paper. He said that it was

and that it was done up in plaster
Paris. We took the trolley car and
went over to New York on a ferry boat."

"Which ferry?"
"I don't know. I am a stranger to
the city, and can't say. When we
reached New York I went home, and
Thorn went to some other place. I cut
open the bundle and found the clothes."
"Whose clothes?" asked the pro-
secutor.

"William Guldensuppe's," replied the
woman emphatically. "I saw Thorn that
evening again, and he told me to meet
him the next day at Twenty-fourth street
ferry and there we arranged about hir-
ing a carriage."

The woman then told in detail that
the other packages were brought in
the survey and deposited in the river
and Ogden woods, near High Bridge.
The woman spoke fairly intelligible
English with a very strong German
accent.

During the recital Thorn's lawyers
left their accustomed seats near the
prisoner, and were accommodated with
chairs closer to the witness. Thorn

IN A DEATHTRAP.

Report of the Slaughter of 35 Sikh Soldiers Confirmed.

Simla, Nov. 10.-The report that a
native officer and 35 Sikhs belonging
to the Kauran column had been in-
tercepted by tribesmen in a ravine and
slaughtered is officially confirmed.
It appears that they were assisting
in a reconnaissance upon the Kurmana
river. Taking a short cut down the
side of a ravine, they were ambushed
by the tribesmen, seeing their predicament,
swarmed on the higher ground, hurled
down rocks upon them and closed
round the men until the whole 35 were
shot or cut down.

The Sikhs fought heroically until the
last, the officer killing two rebel
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fell.
