EASES. The report indicates a marked decline in deaths from contagious diseases or diseases under the public health act. From 1892 to 1897 the decreases of deaths from four different diseases were: Smallpox, 93 per cent; scarlatina, 50 per cent; diphtheria, 6 per cent, and typhoid, 46 per cent.

The decrease in deaths from typhoid is largely due to the introduction of waterworks systems in 100 different places.



Mr. Kemp Pulls a Branch Out of the Water With Fat Oysters on It. An Ottawa dispatch says: Ernest

Kemp, oyster expert of the marine and fisheries department for the Dominion, has returned to the capital. He has lately been inspecting the cyster beds of the Bras d'Or lakes in Cape Breton, northern Nova Scotia. The report consists of a careful analysis of the records of 500 families from the time they applied for aid in 1890 until Sept. 1 of this year. 
