Funeral of the Late Rev. J. A. Murray.

Impressive Service in St. Andrew's Church.

Addresses by Rev. W. J. Clark, Rev. Dr. Milligan, the Bishop of Huron and Rev. J. R. Gundy-Clergymen Present.

The last sad services over the remains of London's oldest Presbyterian minister-Rev. J. Allister Murray-took place in St. Andrew's Church yesterday afternoon in the presence of probably 3,000 people. The time set for the service was 3 o'clock, but for an hour before citizens came pouring in from every quarter of the city. Soon the large edifice was filled, and the ushers had to inform late comers that not an inch of which only the family of the deceased and a few intimate friends were present, was first held in the manse. It seems very strange, indeed, to be gathered in this building, where you have so often listened to him who now lies low proclaiming so powerfully the words of love and truth that he was favored to preach through many years. It brought many thoughts to the minds of the congregation. There were many homes where he had stayed by the bedsides of the sick; he had comforted you in time of distress and trouble, and there are those who can remember that he was the instrument by which they came to know God and his love and his salvation. If all men were to speak today who knew his love and gratitude there would be no time to hear his eloquent story. There are those who are weeping for the loss of a husband and of a father

Mr. Clark then stated that the Bishop of Huron, representing the Bible Society, of which he is president, and of which Mr. Murray was a vice-president; Rev. J. R. ronto, representing the Presbyterian Church in Canada, were to deliver short addresses. Bishop Baldwin was the first to speak. His remarks were of a very earnest character, and moved many of the vast assemblage to tears. "We are called upon this afternoon," said he, "to mourn for one who was not only deeply revered among the members of his own church but by all those who had the pleasure of his acquaintance throughout this city and throughout Canada. I myself felt deeply attached to him, and that attachment arose from the intrinsic worth which I saw within him. I valued him as a witness for the truth the best standard a Christian can possess. I valued him for that integrity to the blessed Word God which he exhibited, for his faithfulness in all that concerns the advancement

of God's glory and the personal kingdom of our blessed Redeemer, who, while we mourn his loss, while we express the sorrow and the bereavement which we suffer, yet at the same time there hangs a halo of glory over all that fall asleep in Jesus.
