960 IN THE SHADE.

In the northeast section of the country Saturday night lower temperatures prevailed under the influence of the area of high pressure central at Boston. In the Northwest the temperatures were lower, ranging from 43 to 70. Helena, Mont., had the lowest, 43 degrees. Buffalo had the highest temperature in the country, registering 96.

HEAT SWELLED THE SCORE. Toronto, Sept. 2.—The number of deaths registered in Toronto during the month of August was 359, or 23 more than the record of the corresponding month last year. The short and fatal torrid spell ran up the score.

forgotten. His figure is rather slight, but as he speaks from the pulpit, his

shoulders and splendidly-shaped head give him an appearance that is altogether most striking, most impressive

in every way. His firm mouth is almost hidden by a heavy mustache and

flowing white beard, his cheeks furrowed by great cares and arduous

work, eyes deep-set beneath thoughtful brows, his head crowned with hair

that is thick as a young man's, long and white as snow, the face wholly

gentle, valiant and venerable. While his appearance bespeaks an attractive

personality, "it indicates in a manner not to be mistaken, capacity equal to

the most arduous enterprises, and fortitude to be shaken by dangers or

reverses."

The story of the man's devotion to the one absorbing passion of his life has been heard by thousands from his

own lips, and to a work that has been read in his autobiography, but it is

impossible, perhaps, to realize the marvelous achievements of Dr. Paton and

his co-workers among the inhabitants of the South Sea Islands. The labors

of the more than 40 years he has spent in the islands where every heathenish

practice was exercised into civilized settlements, where conditions prevail

that might well be an example for old-world communities, and savages whose

every inclination and action were the dictates of barbarous natures have

become earnest, God-fearing Christians. It was in 1858 that he first landed upon

one of the New Hebrides islands and began a labor of love that has brought

him to the honor of a loved wife and his first-born, dangers and difficulties with-

out number, and many assurances of the care of an all-seeing power that

guided him through his trials and per-

mitted him to do a work that has been

read throughout the world, and has

made his name known as one of the

most successful of all those who have

ever obeyed the command "Go

into all the world and preach the
