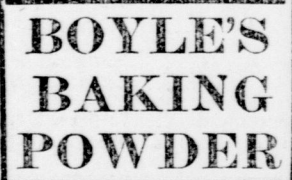

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Wm. Hesse, an electric light lineman, London, sustained a bad fall at the G. T. R. station, St. Thomas, the other evening.

—Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Hannah and Miss Bella Helgate, of East London, left on the C. P. R. evening train for a five days' visit with friends in Toronto.

—S. W. Paisley, liderton, has been summoned to appear before Squire Smyth on a charge of conducting an auction sale in London township without a license.

—Mr. Herbert Feakins, of London West, leaves to-day for Arizona, and while away will visit his brother in New Mexico.

—Mr. Feakins was an active member of the Talbot Street Baptist Church, and will be greatly missed by that congregation.

—The large number who attended the informal reception in the Palace Dancing Academy last evening spent a most enjoyable time. The music was new and inspiring, and the professors omitted nothing tending to the comfort and pleasure of their guests.

—Rev. Bishop Nindé, who is shortly to make a missionary tour of the world, will preach in Queen's Avenue Methodist Church to-morrow on behalf of the missionary society, and will address a public meeting on Monday evening.

—This is Bishop Nindé's first visit to Canada, and there will doubtless be large crowds to hear the distinguished divine.

"The Charity Ball."

The Lindley Company drew a big house at the Grand last night when "The Charity Ball" was produced. Harry Lindley, as Judge Peter Gurney Knox, was entirely at home. The support was excellent throughout, and the performance gave much satisfaction.

Monday "The Gold King" will be placed on the boards. The engagement winds up on Monday night with the production of Mr. Lindley's own piece, "The Man from Galway." This made a decided hit in Hamilton, and will doubtless draw well here.

A Brave Rescue.

Shortly after 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon little Robert Farquhar, of 283 South street, while playing on the north bank of the river just east of Clark's bridge fell into the water. The cries of a woman who saw him brought to the spot Mr. R. McCormick, G. T. R. fireman, of 155 Clarence street, and his uncle, Mr. John Clegg, of Washington State, who were strolling in that direction. Without a moment's hesitation Mr. McCormick plunged into the ice-cold water, clad in his coat, and seized the lad just in time to save his life. He swam to shore with the boy, who seemed more dead than alive, and by tipping him up, working his arms and by other practices necessary in such an emergency, brought him around and perhaps saved his life a second time. Mr. McCormick was drowned. People who saw the rescue speak in enthusiastic praise of Mr. McCormick's bravery in risking his own life to preserve another's. The temperature of the river was such as to place one in great danger of immediate cramp, not to speak of the after-effects of such a chill.

A Double Burial.

The funeral of the late Matthias Cannon, the sad circumstances surrounding whose death have already been chronicled—took place from the family residence, No. 241 Wortley road, South London, to Mount Pleasant Cemetery, yesterday afternoon. The attendance of friends and relatives of the deceased was very large, several coming from a distance. Services were conducted by Rev. Thomas Cullen, pastor of the Askin Street Methodist Church, of which Mr. Cannon had long been an esteemed member. At the house, feeling reference was made by Mr. Cullen to the many good qualities of the deceased. The services at the cemetery, however, were still more impressive. After the casket containing the remains of Mr. Cannon was lowered into the grave those of his young daughter, who died some months ago, were taken from the receiving vault and laid with those of the father. It was a sorrowful sight, and one which the spectators will not soon forget. The Woodmen of the World, of which order deceased was a member, attended to the number of 60, and from that society the pall-bearers—Messrs. W. White, George Dumarsq, C. Jarmain, Geo. Morris, P. W. Smyth, W. Malloy, C. J. Wall and Jas. McCormick—were chosen.

Mr. John V. Reid's Retirement.

The Toronto Globe has the following paragraph: "Much interest was created

in business circles yesterday by the announcement that Mr. John V. Reid had retired from the firm of Buntin, Reid & Co., after nearly 40 years' connection with that well known stationery house. Mr. Reid, born in Berwickshire, Scotland, in 1823, came out to Canada in 1846, settling first in Hamilton, where he carried on a prosperous grocery business for ten years. In 1856 he removed to Toronto, and at once joined what was then the firm of Buntin Bros. & Co. In the early years of his connection he traveled extensively for the house, establishing and extending its trade and reputation. The firm was reorganized as Buntin, Reid & Co. some twelve years ago, when the late Mr. George Boyd retired. Though a very successful business man, Mr. Reid has never taken an active part in public affairs, devoting all his energy to his business, and it is through continued ill-health that he has now decided to seek the rest and leisure which only complete retirement can give. During the many years Mr. Reid has been in active commercial life he has made hosts of business and personal friends in this and many other places, all of whom will unite in the hope that he may be speedily restored to complete health and a full enjoyment of the rest which a long and busy commercial career has earned for him."

Steamship Ashore.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 9.—Superintendent Kimball, of the life-saving service to-night received a telegram from the keeper of Smiths Island, Va., saving station stating that the steamship Chester was ashore on Ship Shoals, near Cape Charles, Va. The steamer is from Amsterdam, bound for Baltimore, and carries a crew of 32.

Hon. Joseph Royal Advocates Canadian Independence.

MONTREAL, March 9.—Hon. Joseph Royal, late Lieutenant-Governor of the Northwest Territory, recently a vicerey and representative of the Queen, and confidential servant and officer of the Dominion Government, has just issued a brochure, urging the separation of Canada from the British Empire. Governor Royal declares that such a step is necessary if Canada is to occupy the position she is entitled to.
