COSSACKS CHARGE ST. PETERSBURG MOB

Student Riots in the Russian Capital, Causing Serious Trouble-800 Arrests.

St. Petersburg, March 18. - The students organized today what was intended to be an imposing demonstration in front of the Cathedral of Our Lady of Kazan, the occasion being the anniversary of the death of Vetrora, the girl who committed suicide some years ago in a dungeon of the political prison in the fortress of St. Peter and St. Paul in order to escape infamous persecutions. Imense crowds assembled on the Nevskoi Prospekt, the principal street of the city, and the adjacent thoroughfares. The military time after time cleared the pavements, making many arrests, including pupils of the higher grade girls' school. The soldiers

drove the people back with whips. Rates Decreasing and Business Showing . Considerable Growth.

Washington, March 18.-United States Consul-General Bittinger, at Montreal, has forwarded to the department of agriculture a report on the postal service of Canada. He says that the report of the service for the last fiscal year shows a deficit of \$461,-661; 9,627 postoffices were in operation; 178,299,500 letters were posted, and money orders aggregating \$16,209,068 were issued.
