

UNIVERSITY MEN ON COAL STRIKE

Banquetter's Flippant Remark
Roused MacVeagh's Ire.

KEEN REBUKE FOR COLLEGE MEN

Cleveland Grand Jury to Investigate
Doings of Dealers' Alleged
Conspiracy.

New York, Jan. 2. — The coal strike question was discussed at a dinner given at Sherry's to the delegates to the university conference.

James W. Alexander, Yale, '60, speaking on "The Universities and Modern Business," suggested playfully that each university should have its trust, and, after assigning various combinations to the different universities, said: "Somebody else can take John Mitchell and the strikers. They are the biggest trust of all."

"The university men must pay more attention to a great question like the coal trouble. An immense industry has drifted out of the hands of the men in charge — honest, well-meaning men, as capable as you and I. But it has drifted out of their hands, and the nation was left to face with a winter without coal. Then a graduate of a university did appear, and he said, 'coal must be mined.' And he was the chief executive. Then another graduate appeared, and almost equal authority, the financial leader, and he said, 'coal must be mined.' But the issue was not entirely settled by either of them. It depended, not of a university graduate, but on the graduate of a coal mine, who said: 'If the arbitration is conceded for which I have been asking for eight months, coal will be mined.'"

"Arbitration was granted and coal was mined, but if one had been less persuasive, and another had not agreed, the coal would have been hermetically sealed for a winter. You must deal not alone with the coal barons — you must deal with the men who mine the coal and bring it to the surface. You must administer the government with the ideals of civic virtue."

SITUATION IN CLEVELAND.

Cleveland, Ohio, Jan. 2. — The grand jury will investigate the actions of the Cleveland coal dealers, and, if possible, secure indictments. Prosecuting Attorney Keefe says the coal dealers are law-breakers, and are guilty of entering into a conspiracy. He says they ought to be in prison. The coal dealers met the other day, and, without any apparent reason, advanced the price of anthracite coal \$1 a ton. The dealers say they are unable to get coal, but this is not true, as there are many cars of it standing on side-tracks waiting until there is a real famine.

People are burning the cheapest quality of dust and slacks and there is but little hard coal to be had at any price. The court house was closed because the coal was not there, and the county could get no more coal. The dealers are concealing their stock of soft coal also, it is alleged, to create a famine. It is known that there should be no shortage of soft coal. The operators at Massillon, where the bulk of the Cleveland supply comes from, say they receive practically no complaints from Cleveland, dealers that coal is not coming fast enough, and they say that they are sending more to Cleveland than ever before. Despite this the dealers have created a famine and have boosted the price of Massillon coal to \$25 a ton.

A careful comparison of cost and selling price this year with those of last year show that the dealers are making an infinitely larger profit this year than last, and it is for this reason that the false famine has been made.

Local officials are greatly worked up over the situation and say they will do something to reduce the price of coal to a decent figure or send some of the dealers to jail.

The city council has appointed a committee to investigate the work of the "coal ring," and the council proposes to get at the trust and break it up if possible. In various parts of the state petitions are being prepared to be sent to the governor asking him to direct the attorney-general to start an investigation and bring actions against the coal men.

SOFT COAL FOR THE SOUTH.

New Orleans, Jan. 2.—Independent coal shippers of Pittsburgh will put 200,000 tons of bituminous coal in New Orleans before next July for distribution to the coal miners market. The first shipment of 30,000 tons arrived yesterday in tow of the tow-boat Oakland, and is the first of a series of shipments that have been arranged for this port, and as fast as the coal can be towed south it will be stocked in the local yards of independent companies.

SCHOOLS CLOSED—NO COAL.

Meriden, Conn., Jan. 1.—On account of lack of coal the schools of this city which were to have been reopened next Monday afternoon have been arranged to have been ordered closed for at least a week longer.

MINERS TOOK HOLIDAY.

Scranton, Pa., Jan. 2.—An effort was made by a coal operator to work the colliers yesterday, but it met with ill success. At each colliery the foremen went around and gave notice to all hands that the company was very desirous of working so that the relieving of the coal famine might not be retarded. Some men reported at every mine, but it was only in a few

instances that enough reported to make a start. Wilkesbarre, Jan. 1.—The miners of the Wyoming Valley region are keeping New Year's Day as a holiday. Nearly all the colliers are idle, and what few are working are short-handed. The output of coal today will be only a few thousand tons.

MINE STATISTICS.

Scranton, Pa., Jan. 1.—Statistics on hours and wages for 1901 have been forwarded to the mine strike commission by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western. Among the items of the summary are these: Number of colliers, 19; number of employees, 11,202; average earnings of miners, \$228.85; percentage of earnings of laborers, \$263.72; average of cars docked, 2; average of ten-hour days breakers worked, 202; average number of days breakers started, 260; average number of hours breakers worked per day, 7.6-10; average number of hours contract miners worked, per ten hours day, 6.53; number of company hands, 2,396; average earnings of company hands, \$514.92; average earnings of boys, \$204.10; average earnings of all employees, \$432.63.

INVESTED \$50,000,000

New York Capitalists Control the Great
Electric Power Plants.

New York, Jan. 2.—New York men have acquired control of the electric power plants of the United States and Canada, says the Herald.

According to the census the total electric power in America in 1900 was \$11,016 horsepower. Great additions have been made since. The additions on the American side of Niagara Falls to be installed as fast as each 5,000 horsepower unit is completed, probably by next August. On the Canadian side, 110,000 horsepower is in process of construction for 1904 by one company and 50,000 horsepower for another. At Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., 57,000 additional horsepower has just been turned on.

At Niagara Falls the financial support of the Niagara Falls Power Company and the Canadian Niagara Power Company is furnished by New York capitalists.

At the Soos, the Michigan Lake Superior Power Company, with 57,000 horsepower on the Michigan side, and the Algoma Commercial Company, Limited, with 20,000 horsepower on the Ontario side, are owned by New York capitalists.

The Great Falls, Mont., Electric Power Company is backed by J. P. Morgan and James J. Hill.

In California the longest electric transmission system in the world is largely financed by a New York capitalist, and the Pike's Peak Power Company, of Colorado is largely owned by New Yorkers.

Montreal, Jan. 1. — Hon. T. E. Armand, the representative of division of Repentigny, Que., in the Dominion Senate, died in the city tonight. Senator Armand was one of the few remaining members of the senators who was appointed to that body by royal proclamation on its organization in 1867. He had previously been a member of the Legislative Council of Canada. He was born at Riviere des Prairies, Que., in 1820. He was a Conservative in politics.

Jefferson City, Mo., Jan. 1. — The wife of Governor Dockery died today after an illness of several weeks.

London, City, Feb. 1. — John Nitzsche died today in his 96th year. Mr. Nitzsche headed a colony from Canada, which settled here in 1846, and later was a member of the fifth, sixth and seventh sessions of the Nebraska Legislature.

Butte, Mont., Jan. 1.—Mrs. William J. Clark, jun., died today. Mrs. Clark was born 23 years ago near Pittsburgh, Pa., the daughter of John H. Foster, who came to Butte nearly seventeen years ago. On June 13, 1901, she was married to William A. Clark, jun., youngest son of Senator W. A. Clark. Her baby boy, for whom she gave her life, was born Dec. 2.

INAUGURATION OF THE NEW YEAR

How the Day Was Observed at
Ottawa and Washington.

GREETINGS FROM AUSTRALIA

Premier Barton to Sir Sandford Flem-
ing—Brilliant Affair at the
White House.

Ottawa, Jan. 2.—New Year's Day was generally observed as a holiday, and people spent it outdoors. His excellency the Governor-General's New Year's reception was attended by over 500—the largest for years. His excellency was attended by a guard of honor from the local garrison, and Lord Dundonald, Lord Aylmer and nearly all the headquarters staff were present in uniform. Capt. Bell, A. D. C., and Major Maude accompanied his excellency.

GREETINGS FROM AUSTRALIA.

Ottawa, Jan. 2.—In reply to Sir Sandford Fleming's cable of New Year's greetings by the Pacific cable, the following message was today received from Sir Edward Barton, premier of the Australian Commonwealth:

"Sydney, N. S. W., Jan. 1, 1902: Your New Year's greeting heartily reciprocated by Australian partners in Pacific cable. May it prove an eternal bond of friendship between the two great British federations. (Signed) Barton."

Wednesday was the second anniversary of the signing of the agreement for the construction of the line.

HAD A WILD TIME.

Newark, N. J., Jan. 1. — Four persons were shot today as the result of John Hackett's celebration of the opening of 1902. Hackett had discharged one barrel of his shot gun, and was preparing to fire the other, when it was prematurely discharged. The greater part of the charge of shot entered the chest of Lena Sidoroff. She is dangerously wounded. The other victims were Mrs. L. Neldorf, shot in the face and head; Mrs. J. Werna and Peter Werna, both of whom were shot in the face. Hackett was arrested.

AT ALBANY. Albany, N. Y., Jan. 1.—For the first time in fifteen years there was no returning Governor to welcome the incoming Governor of the State of New York today at noon, when the inaugural ceremony took place in the assembly chamber of the State Capitol, and Benjamin B. Odell, jun., the first Governor to be elected since D. W. D. Hill succeeded himself in 1888, took the oath of office, and delivered his second inaugural address.

The occasion was an unusually brilliant one, and marked by the presence of many distinguished visitors and the participation of a large representation of the National Guard.

People from all parts of the State had been gathering since early morning, and the streets were thronged, when at 10:30 the procession, with nearly 2,000 in line, started for the capitol.

When the procession entered the capitol, the Governor and his party returned to the executive chamber, where he held a reception until 1 o'clock.

AT THE WHITE HOUSE.

Washington, Jan. 1.—President Roosevelt's New Year's reception was one of the most brilliant events in Washington's recent social history. All callers were afforded the opportunity of greeting the President and Mrs. Roosevelt, and exchanging with them the compliments of the New Year. No distinctions were made except such as were rendered necessary in the preservation of order and the reception of people from all high and low, rich and poor—were alike cordial and sincere.

Today the general public, for the first time, had an opportunity to see the widely heralded improvements in the White House—improvements which when completed will have cost \$500,000. The changes made were a revelation. While, in a general way, the room of the interior were retained, in beauty and effectiveness it is wholly different.

102 YEARS AGO.

Just 102 years ago today President John Adams and his wife opened the White House with a New Year's reception. The dawn of the first festive day within the walls was accompanied by the noise of the saw and hammer, as the building was hurriedly prepared to receive the guests.

At 11 o'clock, when the reception was held in the blue room. The members of the diplomatic corps, attired in magnificent court uniforms, were received first. As dean, Herr Von Holleben, the German ambassador, occupied the post of honor at the head of the line, the position held for many years by the late Lord Palmerston.

All of the ambassadors and ministers were accompanied by their entire suites, their uniforms weighted with a wealth of gold lace and rich embroidery. The reception, presented a gorgeous spectacle. In all 25 embassies and legations were represented. Soon after the diplomatic corps had been received, Secretary of State and Mrs. Hay left the receiving line and repaired to their residence, where at noon they entertained at luncheon the foreign diplomatic representation in the city.

After the diplomats, President and Mrs. Roosevelt received the supreme court judges, headed by Chief Justice Fuller, followed by the judges of the circuit courts and ex-members and ex-ministers of the United States, Senators, representatives and delegates in Congress. Then came the military contingent.

At 1 o'clock the reception to the citizens generally began. For hours people of all ages, colors, sexes and conditions had been waiting. The line passed slowly through the main entrance of the White House across the corridor into the red room, and thence past the President and party in the blue room. President Roosevelt had a happy, cheery greeting for all.

WESTERN ONTARIO.

There died at the residence of his son, J. E. Nelson, jeweler, on Tuesday night, the 31st inst., a Jew of the name of Thomas, aged 90 years. Mr. Nelson was of Scotch descent, born in St. Petersburg, Russia, in 1812. He came to this country 55 years ago, and was in business in St. Thomas over 90 years.

LEAPING FOR DEAR LIFE

Many Factory Girls in Danger of
Creption.

150 Persons Thrown Out of Employ-
ment—Other Conflagrations.

Port Dodge, Iowa, Jan. 1.—Fire last night destroyed the grain elevator and 100,000 bushels of oats belonging to the Great Western Cereal Company, of Port Dodge. The loss is \$125,000. The fire started from a defective connection of the machinery caused a spark which resulted in an explosion on the top floor of the building.

Bristol, Conn., Jan. 1.—The late this afternoon caused damage to the amount of \$12,000 to the stockette factory of N. L. Birge, Sons & Co. The origin of the fire is believed to have been spontaneous combustion in the stockroom of the factory. The blaze caused a panic among the girls employed in the factory on the upper floors. Five of the girls jumped two and a half stories to the ground, and Winnie Buskey, 19 years of age, sustained a broken leg and a sprained ankle. A number of employees were taken to the ground in safety by the firemen. The damage caused by the fire will throw 150 persons out of employment.

SCIENCE BAFFLED
