Toronto, Jan. 31.-A strike of telephone operators was suddenly precipitated today at noon, when the company asked the girls to sign an agree ment accepting new terms, or hand in their resignation. At once 250 girls walked out, leaving only one operator in the room. While this dramatic action was in progress, Manager Dunston was discussing the situation with Deputy Minister of Labor McKenzie King and John Armstrong, secretary of the provincial labor bureau.

The strike was called for Friday morning, but this action on the part of the management precipitated a crisis. There is at present not a 'phone in the city working.
