A cotton-picking machine has been  
devised on lines similar to the vacuum  
process cleaning machines by J. S.  
Thurman. The vacuum producing ap-  
paratus, driven by a gasoline engine,  
is mounted on a wide-wheel truck,  
which is drawn about the cotton field  
by mules. Each operator has 100 feet  
of hose with the picker suction tip at  
the end. It is claimed that each op-  
erator can gather 700 pounds of seed cot-  
ton per day of ten hours at a total  
cost of from \$2.45 to \$3.10 per opera-  
tion per day.

property passed to the Earl of Pem-

broke, and through him to the Earl of

Lancaster, and when that great family

died out, it returned to the crown, and

in 1338 was granted to another crusad-

ing order, The Knights Hospitallers of

St. John of Jerusalem, who held it till

their order was disbanded in the reign

of Henry VIII.

In the early part of 1343 the Hospi-

talers leased parcels of it to the lay stu-

dents, a rapidly-increasing class, and

by degrees its warlike character gave

place to the studious quiet, only broken

now and then by the noisy revels of the

students, and the quiet life of the

monks, who were now only a shadow of

their former power.

The question of the hucksters on the
