Philadelphia, June 17.—Once more have the Tiger pennant winners returned to their normal gait. After letting the Athletics nose them out in the 5 to 4 contest of the day before, the Champions returned with renewed vigor today and just narrowly missed coasting Mack's team with a liberal supply of kalamintine. The final score was 4 to 1, with the visitors having a clutch on the larger figure.

Eddie Summers Weakened.
Philadelphia's score would have been 0 instead of 1, had not Eddie Summers, after pitching magnificent ball throughout the earlier innings, eased up in the final round and permitted the locals enough bingles to net them the single tally.

Summers appeared in great form today. The old-time Philadelphia hoodoo made good use of his arm and the Pennsylvanians found him practically invincible. Seven hits were secured off the knuckleball artist in the nine innings.

Three Hits in Final.
Three of these came in the final round. The other four were thinly sprinkled through as many of the opening period as the Tigers.

But while one hoodoo was making good, another was forfeiting his title. "Eddie" Plank, always a stiff proposition for the Tigers to face, was as docile as a lamb before the Champions today. "Eddie" remained in the box seven innings. The Champions had gotten to him for a trio of runs during this period and Connie Mack jerked the twirler from the box and sent Dygert in.

Dygert Makes His Exit.
The latter made a very good impression at the start by fanning two of the three men who faced him in the seventh. But in the following inning the pitcher's wildness was responsible for the fourth score that the visitors made and he, too, made his exit at the close of the round.

Coombs was the third Philadelphia twirler to face the league leaders, twirling the game. He pitched the final inning, which proved to be a very brief one, without letting the Tigers fatten their score any further.

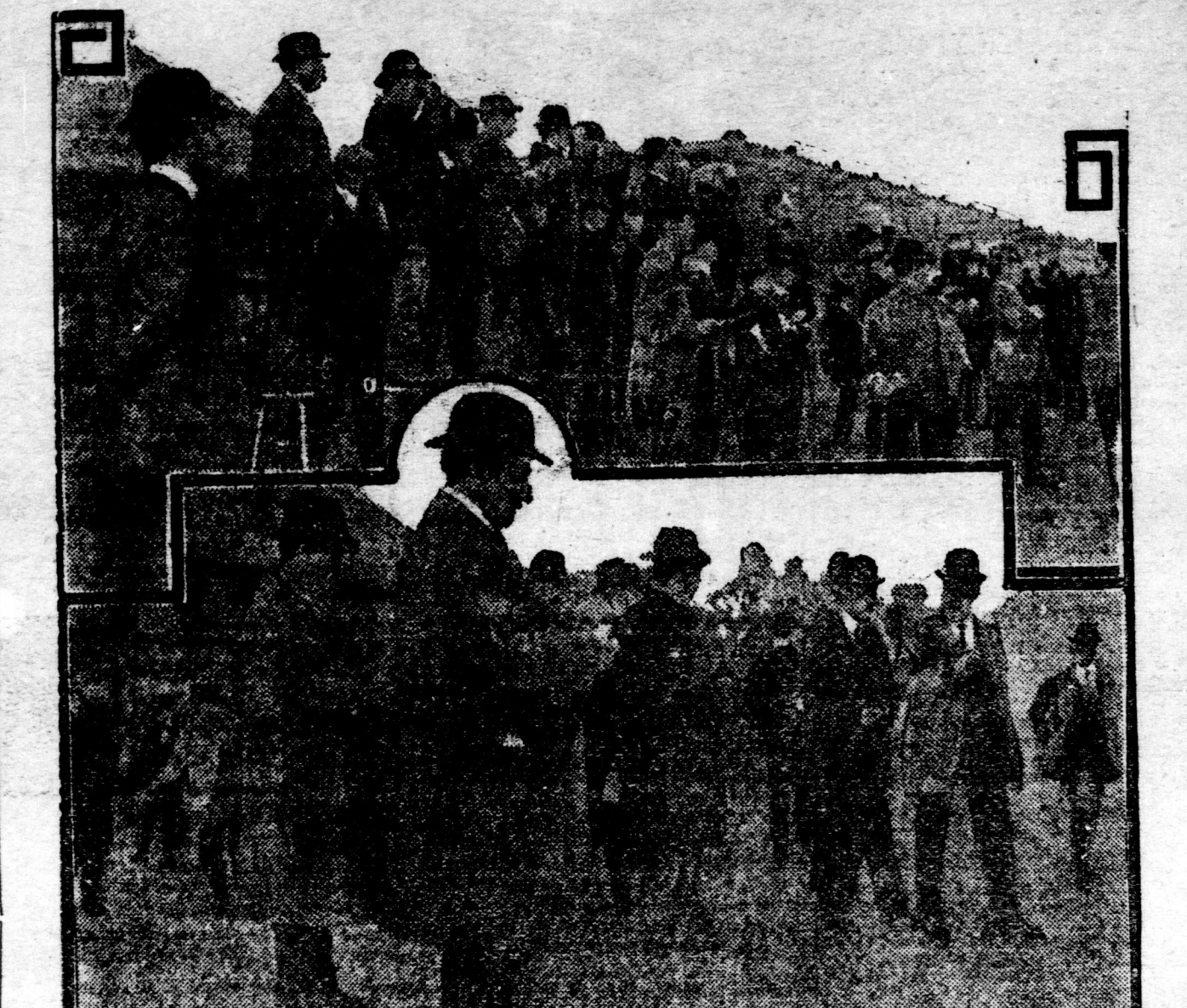
RED SOX AND WHITE SOX SPLIT EVEN YESTERDAY

NO JOY FOR BOOKIES IN RACING REGULARS TOO HARD TO BEAT

New York, June 17.—Horse racing doesn't bring the joy to bookmakers it did in the halcyon days before the Hughes law and other anti-gambling measures began to operate here and in other sections. In New York there is betting, of course, but the volume is not sufficient to pay the bookies for remaining in business. They may clean up a few dollars a day, and some who have wealthy patrons are making money, but the majority, who depend upon the public upon the pickers, as they term them—are in Dutch.

Oral betting virtually means no betting for the public. Under the old regime a man with \$5 or \$10 could go to the track and invest in three or four \$1 and \$2 tickets. With thousands of such pickers, the bookmakers made fortunes.

The law now prohibits the exchange of paper, the making of memoranda, or showing of money. Bookies aren't accepting high signs from those they don't know. The bets are verbal, and this bars the pickers, who remain away from the track or content themselves with betting with friends.

WORLD'S AUTO RECORD FOR 25 MILES BROKEN
Roadville, Mass., June 17.—The world's automobile record for 25 miles was broken at the Roadville race track today by Ralph de Palma. His time was 23 minutes 35 seconds. Barney Oldfield's old record, 23 minutes 38 3/4 seconds, was made at Fresno, Cal., on Dec. 13, 1904.

JEFFRIES IN BUFFALO IN TEN DAYS' TIME
Greatest Heavyweight of Them All Will Box There June 26.

Buffalo, June 18.—James J. Jeffries will box six rounds with his sparring partner, Sam Berger, in a 24-foot ring, pitched in the centre of the Exposition Stadium, in this city on Saturday night, June 26.

This announcement means that for the next ten days Buffalo will be an important spot in the pugilistic world. With men prominent in business, professional and social life occupying seats at the ringside, Jeffries appeared in a six-round affair in Pittsburgh Tuesday night, and the event created more excitement than any sporting event pulled off there in recent years.

TORONTO GETS NEWTON.
Toronto, June 16.—President McCafferty of the Eastern League leaves word today that he has bought Pitcher Doc Newton from the American League team in New York. Newton, who went from Montreal to New York in 1907, won seven games and lost ten in 1908. He should strengthen the Leafs, who are desperately in need of pitchers.

DONLIN WON'T PLAY.
New York, June 18.—Mike Donlin, who captained and played right field for the New York Nationals last season, has written to a friend here that there is no chance of his playing ball this season, and that he will make only a short stay in New York on his return from California next week. Donlin says he has engaged passage to Europe for himself and wife and will sail on July 15. He adds that reports of his illness have been much exaggerated, and that he is now feeling "in prime condition."

RUN FLAG-TO-FLAG RACE IN NOVEMBER

Originator of Denver-to-Mexico City Event Changes the Date.

Mexico City, Mexico, June 17.—C. A. Wahlgren, of Denver, originator of the flag-to-flag automobile race, to be run between Denver and Mexico City, said last night that the date would be changed from the first of next year to November of this year. He says the route might be changed so the cars will enter Mexico at Eagle Pass or Laredo instead of El Paso. Arrangements were completed today to hold a large automobile show in Mexico City as soon as the race is over.

BRITISH AND AMERICANS HEADED THE PRIZE LISTS
Englishmen Took 11 Cups, Americans 8 and France and Canada One Each.

London, June 18.—The predominance of American and British horses in the international horse show evidently throughout the ten days of judging at Olympia, has been further emphasized by the complete prize lists that now are available. British owners headed the list of prize winners in point of numbers, but a comparison of the number of winners to entries gives the Americans by far the best average. In the championship list America showed a still better average, taking eight cups against Great Britain's eleven out of a total of twenty-one.
