FIGHT TO A FINISH IN QUAKER CITY

The Street Car Company Refuse Absolutely to Arbitrate and General Strike Will Follow.

Philadelphia, March 3. — The directors of the Rapid Transit Company have determined to smother the carmen's union if they have to fight the whole city of Philadelphia, and throw the company into the hands of a receiver in doing so. All pretence of conciliation has been thrown aside.

On the other hand, the 124 unions that have pledged themselves to strike in sympathy with the carmen next Saturday are massing their forces for a battle which will make or break labor unionism in this city. Union men who have been on the most friendly terms with their employers notified them last night that they would have to quit work when the strike goes on.

This is the situation after days of effort on the part of the influential merchants' and citizens' associations to bring about peace. Their failure is due to the remarkable impetuosity of one man, George H. Belton, who does not believe that the results of arbitration could possibly be permanent. He believes that the company would have to make the same fight again with a set of men who have no respect for agreements.

The hope of intervention seems so remote that employers of labor are preparing to make the best of things when the trouble comes to the town on Saturday. Many plants expect to shut up absolutely. Others expect they will be able to run on half-time. It looks as if the theatre will be dark. Managers were notified yesterday.

Just how many men will quit work on Saturday is all guesswork. John J. Murphy, president of the Quaker City Union, boasts that he can crack the whip over 150,000 workmen. Few save Mr. Murphy believe that so many will strike. A conservative estimate puts the number at 25,000.

WHITNEY SLAUGHTERS TWO MORE MEASURES

Dr. Godfrey's Radical Bill to Eradicate Imbecility De-nounced by Premier.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, March 2.—Two altruistic bills were slaughtered in the Legislature yesterday, the Government pronouncing sentence of death on Mr. Downey's bill to prevent the spread of tuberculosis, and Mr. Godfrey's bill to prevent the procreation of idiots, criminals, imbeciles and rapists. Although private members on both sides of the chamber expressed approval of both measures, the cabinet ministers who spoke expressed the opinion that the time was not ripe for their passing, while the Premier was even more outspoken in his views, and condemned both severely.

Mr. Godfrey (West York), in moving the second reading of his unusual bill, said that he had framed it only after the most serious consideration and investigation. The province paid a million dollars last year to look after the incapables whose procreation would be stopped by the bill he offered. If the same attention was paid to the breeding of children as to the breeding of animals, great good would result. There was much talk of race suicide, but Dr. Godfrey believed that the family request more quality and less quantity. If his bill passed, there would be no imbeciles 50 years hence. If the Government rejected the bill, Dr. Godfrey said he would not despair, but would bring it up again. It had taken ten years to secure the passage of a similar law in Indiana.

Mr. Studholme expressed the opinion that the scheme would be entirely workable, and would solve much of the criminal problem.

Whitney Opposes. Sir James Whitney hoped Dr. Godfrey would withdraw the bill, and if not, that every other member of the House would vote against the second reading. He hoped such a bill would never be introduced in the House again. The Legislature might as well serve notice at once on Providence to abolish its own way of peopling the world, and allow the physicians, perhaps of a low order of morality, to say what proportion of human beings should be allowed to live. It was not worth wasting the time of the House discussing the bill further.

Dr. Godfrey said he was compelled to bow to the first minister's wishes. He had not thought that he was making such a serious mistake in introducing the bill, seeing that the great State of Indiana had made it law, and other states were seriously considering that step. He resented the Premier's remarks about the morality of medical men, saying that there were no fairer, better or nobler men had done more and for less money to uplift the province than had the medical men. Dr. Godfrey said he was not ashamed that he had candidly and conscientiously stated the condition which demanded the remedy proposed by his bill, and though he withdrew it, it was with the determination to introduce it at some future time.

Downey's Bill. Mr. Downey (South Wellington), made his annual address in support of his bill to prevent the spread of tuberculosis. Explaining the clause which he referred to the serious ravages of the disease. It had been calculated that the economic loss to the province from premature deaths by tuberculosis was \$1,000,000 every five years. If the old ideas about tuberculosis had been correct, there would be no justification for the present bill, but now it was known that it was a contagious, infectious and preventable disease. Compulsory notification, which was provided for in the bill, was essential in the fight against tuberculosis, because without it any attempt to battle against an enemy whose numbers were not known was like beating the air. There was no intention to placard houses, and a clause in the bill provided a fine of from \$5 to \$20 for disclosures to unauthorized persons regarding the existence of the disease in families.

Since the last session of the Legislature progress had been made in the direction of adopting compulsory notification. Nova Scotia and Saskatchewan had adopted this measure, while the Connecticut State commission had reported that betterment of conditions was impossible.

Progress has been made by the establishment in Ontario, in Hamilton, London and other places of sanatoriums, but the province should not stop there. The necessity for taking a step forward was shown by the fact that despite what progress had been made the death rate was still almost as large as it was ten years ago.

Mr. McDougall (East Ottawa), believed that the Legislature should approve the principle of compulsory notification, and he hoped the bill would pass.

would go to the committee. He suggested, however, that municipal medical men, possessed of efficient organized bodies dealing with tuberculosis should not be compelled to adopt the system of compulsory notification.

Dr. Jessop (Lincoln), and Dr. Anderson (South Essex), both spoke briefly on the bill, favoring the general idea of more aggressive measures against tuberculosis, but disagreed with some of the details of the bill.

Whitney Objects Again. Sir James Whitney said that the proposed benefits of the bill were very difficult to set out and understand. The Legislature was not here to legislate along academic and theoretical lines. All agreed that tuberculosis was a dread disease, but it was also known that the death rate was practically stationary, and he believed it would remain so in spite of all efforts. The people who most needed care and attention were those who could not be reached by the bill, for its operation depended upon the calling in of physicians. Those who were already receiving the attention of physicians would not be benefited by the bill. Better the attention of one family physician than the visit of a dozen doctors forced upon the family through legislation. What good would it do a patient who was already being treated by his family doctor to receive a lot of printed directions from the board of health?

Mr. Gagey interrupted with a statement that expert instruction was needed, supplemented by common sense. The physician in Ontario did not understand the proper treatment of tuberculosis. This statement drew a chorus of dissent from the doctors in the House.

Sir James, continuing, said he had quite as much confidence in the average physician as in the average specialist. There was something to be said for the liberties and privileges for the people, and so long as he was in possession of his liberties and privileges would be kept in mind. The poor man's home should not be broken into and his family torn asunder on a pretence of benefitting the community, for this would be the result of the bill. The persons who were so poor that they never saw a doctor could derive no benefit from the bill, while a good purpose was served by the discussion. Sir James said his response to his conscience would not allow the bill to go to a committee. He asked that the bill be withdrawn.

Mr. Studholme strongly supported the bill. Hon. Mr. James reviewed the progress already made in the treatment of tuberculosis, and Mr. Downey withdrew his bill.

Amend Truancy Act. Mr. Innes (North York), has a bill to amend the truancy act, as the act now stands municipal councils of cities, towns and villages shall appoint and control one or more truant officers, for the purpose of enforcing the act. The section does not require township councils to appoint such officers, but leaves it optional. The intention of Mr. Innes' bill is to put the township in the same position as other municipalities, that is, that township councils shall appoint truant officers to enforce the act. The education of the children in the country and rural municipalities is as important as the education of children in other municipalities, he says. Mr. Innes also has a bill to amend the public schools act. As the bill now stands whenever a school board deems it expedient to erect a new school building the board selects a site and calls a meeting of ratepayers, and upon the decision of the majority rests the selection or ratification of the site. A site is sometimes selected at the extreme end of a section or otherwise to the disadvantage and detriment of some of the ratepayers.

Mr. Innes' bill provides that where new sites are selected they shall be as near as possible to the centre of the section, thus making an equitable distance to be travelled by all children.
