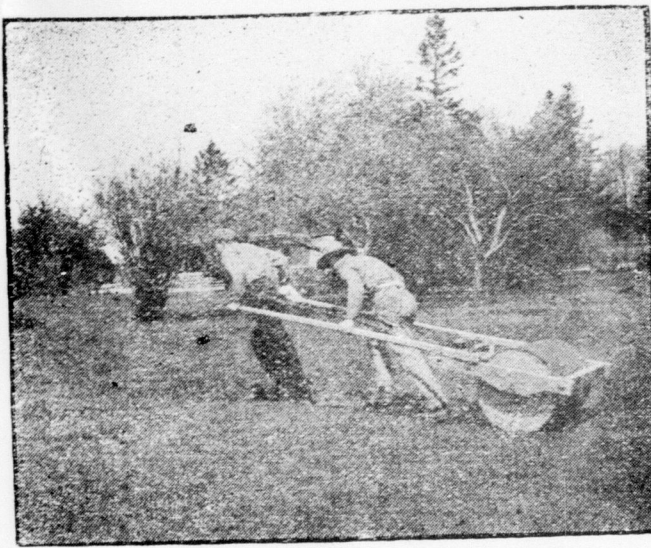

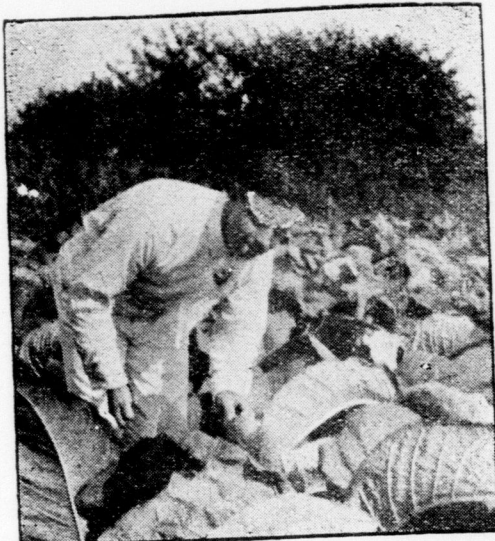

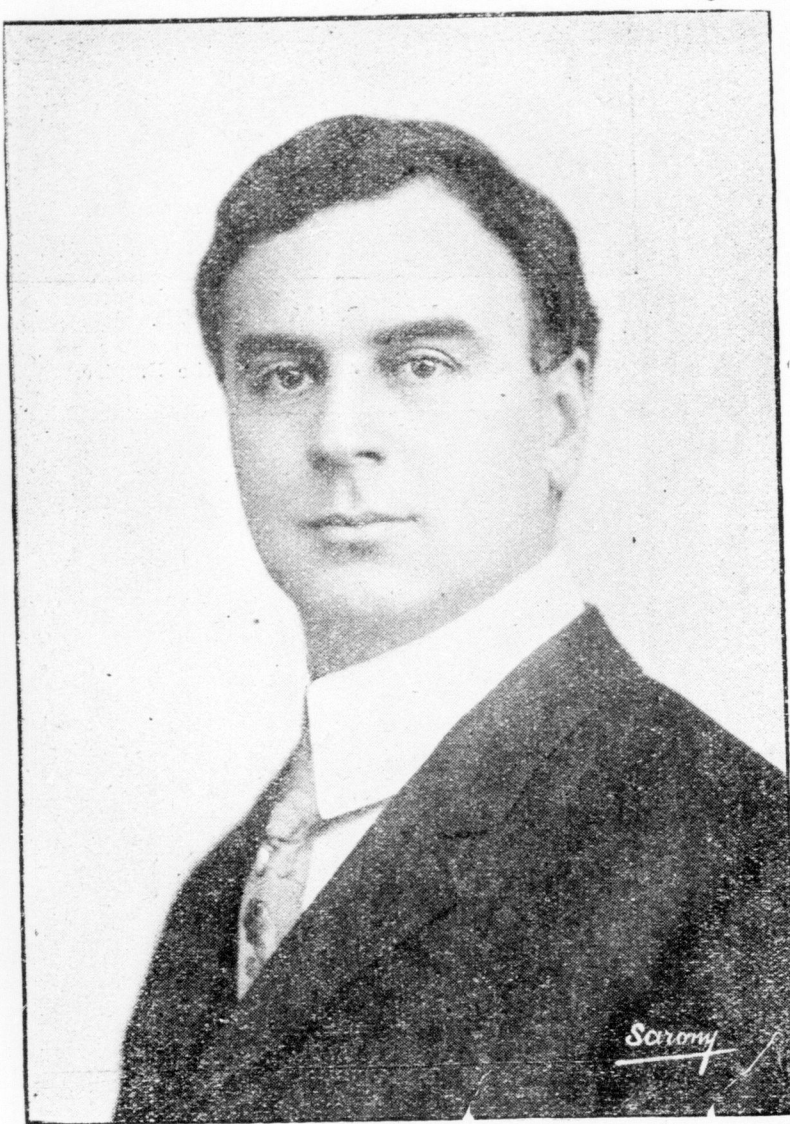
The author and another good horse at work on the tennis court.

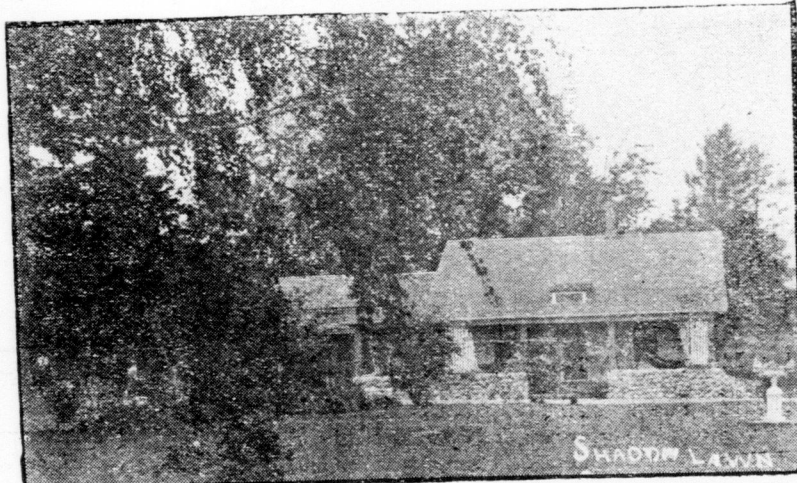

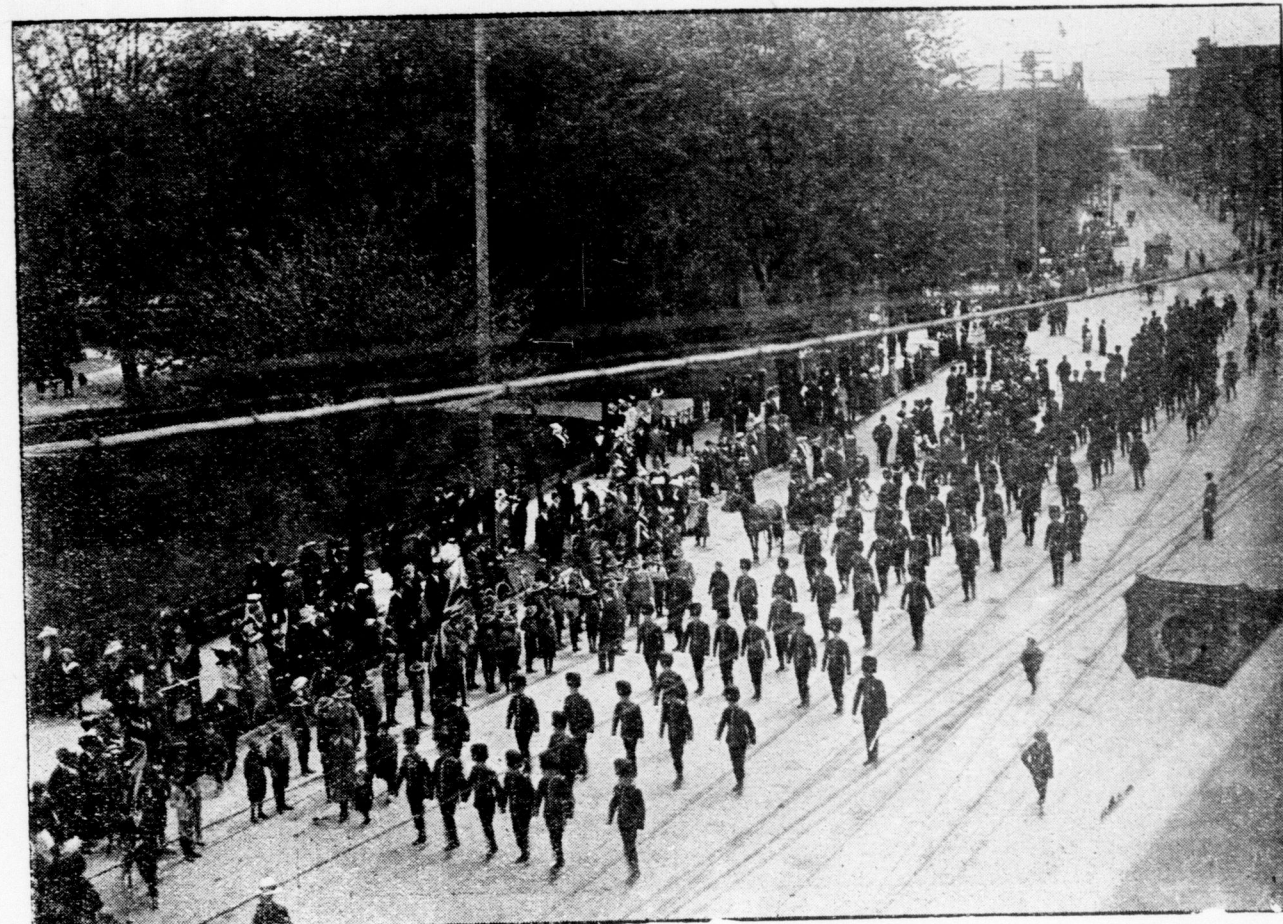
The fairest flower that blooms in the profuse gardens of Shadowlawn.

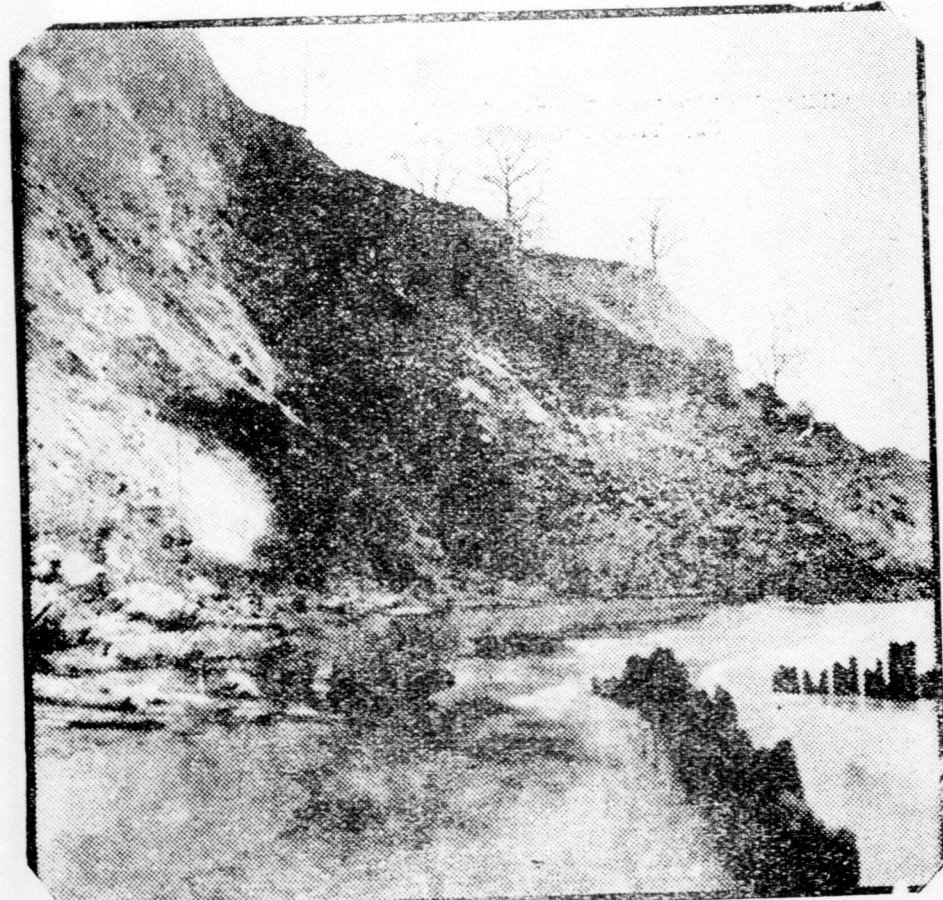
