London is fast earning a reputation as a city of near-championships. the past three or four years this city has come within an ace of winning a championship in aport on several occasions. The other day we heard a stranger in this city remark on it so that it has happened often enough to be noticeable in out-of-town places. The present year has been an eventful one in this respect. Starting last winter, the London hockey team, after winning its district championship easily, fell down badly in the second round of the O.H.A. series. The only redeeming feature of the hockey season last winter was the victory of the Western University team over Wiarton for the Northern League title. However, Western later was beaten by Berlin Intermediate O.H.A. cham pions in an exhibition game, showing that London just lacked the calibre of a

London again lost the Canadian league championship by a small margin, making the second time in two Pears that the local club has had the pennant almost in its grasp only to lose it in the final sprint. The W.F.A. senior football championship was another title that London just missed this season. The London Bolt Works team made Stratford play four games before the honors went to the Classic City, another demonstration that this city can seemingly only get as far as the runner-up class in its efforts to land a championship.

Both the Western University and Y.M.C.A. basketball teams went into the

finals of the O.B.A. series last spring, the Meds in the senior and the Y.M.C.A. in the junior, but in the final games both teams were defeated, the championships going to Hamilton. True, the Y.M.C.A. did manage to capture the senior Hexathlon championship of Canada, but that is only the exception that proves the rule. In hockey, London has gone twice into the finals in the past five years, and each time been beaten out in the final game. In baseball, a championship has been snatched from London on the last day of the schedule twice in the past two seasons. London hasn't been near enough to a rugby championship in several seasons past to make any mention of it. The present rugby season is not yet over, but so far the fans are not raving over London's chances to capture the junior honors, although anything is liable to happen. We have produced a lot of district winners in this city, but every time we fall just a little shy of landing a real dyed-in-the-wool championship. If this city evers wins a rugby, hockey or baseball championship the team that does it ought to have a monument erected in its honor.

The London club has not been in communication with "Doc" Reisling since it was learned that he would not again manage the London club for the salary paid him last season. Apparently, the matter is closed as far as both parties are concerned, and it looks as though London will have to go out and seek another man again next spring. Local fans hardly get acquainted with one man-ager before another comes along to replace him.

The London directors seem to work on the theory that it is cheaper to move than to pay rent. No matter who manages the London club next season, he is going to have a nice job on his hands. With a big hole at first base to fill and a catching and pitching staff to plug up, it will keep him busy producing a



BOSTON, Oct. 20 .- Sam Langford, the negro heavyweight of Boston, knocked out Gunboat Smith, of New York, in three rounds here tonight. It was the first time that the leading white hope of this country, who had previously gained a decision over Langford, had been knocked out.

The first round was half finished when a sweeping right felled Smith for a count of seven. Smith finished the first round in a weak condition.

In the second round Langford again took the aggressive. Leading a left he hammered a right home to Smith's jaw, crushing him to the mat. Smith sprawled there for nine seconds, staggering to his feet barely in time to save himself from being counted out. Feinting and landing with left and right, Langford rocked Smith with his blows and floored him again.
