

## ROOSEVELT'S LONGEST LETTER ON KHARTOUM TO LONDON JOURNEY

The Former President Made Searching Comments On Kings.

### BRITISH RULE IN EGYPT

Praised It On the Whole As Task of Putting Twentieth Century On Seventh.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Col. Roosevelt's "longest letter," a 25,000-word personal account of his trip from Khartoum to London in 1909, and which is described by his biographer, Joseph Bucklin Bishop, as "a human document of exceptional character," appears as the first of two installments in the February issue of *Seventeenth Century*. "Sometime after retiring from the presidency," explains Mr. Bishop, "the colonel went to Africa on a hunting trip. He had arranged before his departure for several formal addresses, which he was to make in Germany, England, France and Norway on his return. When he reached Khartoum in March, 1910, on his way home, he yielded to urgent appeals and made two addresses on Egyptian affairs, one at Khartoum and the other at Cairo, which aroused much controversy and led later to a speech on the same subject in London. In urgent return, the *Guinness* in London.

**Khartoum To Rome.**  
"From Khartoum he went to Rome, Vienna, Budapest, Paris, Brussels, The Hague, Copenhagen, Christiania, Stockholm, Berlin and thence to London. At the close of his tour he paid a long visit to his long-time correspondent and friend, Sir George Grey, at Wellesbourne, Stratford-on-Avon. During the visit his narrative of his experiences in Egypt and Europe so strongly impressed Sir George that he urged him most earnestly to put it in writing. This Roosevelt did, and the following year, in the form of a letter to Trevelyan, under date of October 1, 1911."

The former president, in the misty, made "frank and searching comments upon the characteristics and personalities of kings, emperors and other eminent persons with whom he came in contact," and in the opening paragraph requested that it should not be made public "until long after all of us who are now alive are dead." Trevelyan, in authorizing its publication, said: "I do not hesitate to say that it should be published, and the sooner the better. The world would be much the richer for it. The times are such that the human interest and solid value of this wonderful paper would be very great indeed now."

**Intimate Picture.**  
The colonel drew an intimate picture of British rule in Egypt, praised it on the whole, and declared that the task of "super-imposing the twentieth century upon the seventh" was a mighty one "which only a great and powerful nation could attempt, and which it is a high and honorable thing to have attempted." Nearly 3,000 words are devoted to "The Vatican Incident," and the reason Roosevelt was not presented to Pope Pius X. A central Methodist clergyman in Rome had been conducting an attack upon the head of the Catholic Church and when Vice-President Fairbanks, some time before, visited the Holy City, the supreme pontiff stipulated that he would receive him in audience if he addressed Methodist gatherings. Roosevelt took the same attitude as Fairbanks, and he "must decline to submit to any conditions which in any way limit my freedom of conduct."

The colonel said in his letter to Sir George that one of his volunteer secretaries at that time was "anxious to prevent the Vatican from committing what he felt would be a great blunder," and while the colonel was at Naples went to Rome to see the then papal secretary of state, Cardinal Merry del Val. "The stipulation by the Pope was not withdrawn and Col. Roosevelt adhered to his meeting of making no agreement to refrain from speaking before Methodist meetings. 'Accordingly,' he wrote, 'I was not presented at the Vatican.'"

In a public statement at the time, the colonel declared that the respect and regard of those of his fellow Americans who are Catholics are as dear to me as the Protestants," and he expressed the hope that the incident would be treated as a merely personal matter without rancor or bitterness.

## BEST MOTHERS ARE JEWISH, BIRTHRATE COMMISSIONER SAYS

LONDON, Feb. 10.—The best mothers in London's east side, the poor districts, are Jewish, in the opinion of Dr. C. W. Saleeby, chairman of the National Birthrate Commission, as expressed in an address at University College, Dr. Saleeby added that Irish mothers were not a bad second, and that the English ranked as a very bad third.

## Borah Terms Treaty Murderous

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 10.—Although it was laid aside for further discussion in the Senate next week, today the peace treaty "would not down." Some of the irreconcilables among the senators insisted upon expressing their views of the pact after it had been decided to place the document in storage for a while.

"Cruel" and "murderous" were among the adjectives employed by Senators Borah and Knox to describe the effect of the treaty on Germany and Austria. They declared its effect would be to impoverish Germany and destroy the cornerstone on which rested the financial stability of Europe.

"We are asked," said Senator Borah, "to agree to a treaty that will impoverish millions, and then we are asked to appropriate money to feed the people we have impoverished."

Senator Hitchcock, Democratic leader, suggested that Mr. Lloyd George had been led to make "impossible exactions" from Germany by promises given in the heat of a political campaign. He said the United States could best exert its influence for alleviation of the peace terms by ratifying the treaty and accepting membership on the reparations commission.

## CLAIMS POLICEMEN DEMANDED GRAFT

Hotel Owner Sues To Restrain Officers From Raiding Place.

DETROIT, Feb. 10.—Accusing two policemen, whom he mentions only by number, of demanding that he "come across" with money to obtain immunity from raid on his place of business, F. J. Barry, who claimed the wife of a man who died in an ante-mortem statement, and J. Calhoun of Montreal, who died in the Salt Block Boiling House, Sunday, from drinking the poisonous fluid.
