The only practical system, he thought, was the one elaborated in India during his residence there, wherein the most important provision was to

Favors Famine Camp.

He declared that the experiences in India showed that when the people were wandering over the country the only method was to establish a large famine camp and keep the people there until they could be returned to their own villages. He would have the camp under the village system of administration such as had been established in India.

Lord McDonnell urged the Government to grant from thirty to fifty million sterling for relief measures.

Little Information.

The Earl of Crawford, replying, said official information from Russia was very meagre, but it was clear that the country's position was one of utmost danger, involving partial or complete failure of crops in the middle and lower basins of the Volga River. The Soviet Government had reported 27,000 cases of cholera. Measures had been taken to keep cases out of Great Britain and all the dominions had been fully informed of the situation. The supreme council, he said, was considering remedial action, which will include preventive measures in regard to the spread of the disease to the dominions.
