

The only practical system, he thought, was the one elaborated in India during his residence there, wherein the most important provision was to secure a pure water supply.

Favors Famine Camp.

He declared that the experiences in India showed that when the people were wandering over the country the only method was to establish a large famine camp and keep the people there until they could be returned to their own villages. He would have the camp under the village system of administration such as had been established in India.

Lord McDonnell urged the Government to grant from thirty to fifty million sterling for relief measures.


