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DEFENDS KING FROM ATTACK OF COAL MINER

Draper Claims Premier's Hands Tied in Case of Troops Called Out.

SAYS PROVINCE AT FAULT

Labor Congress Asks Nova Scotian Government To Send Soldiers Back.

MONTREAL, Aug. 24.—The latest convention of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress in many years reached its closing stage today with only a slight flare-up, in which a lone delegate defied the entire convention and demanded repudiation of the League of Nations.

Voluminous sections of the executive's report were indorsed without opposition, resolutions were indorsed with scanty debate, and virtually every suggestion made by President Tom Moore and Secretary P. M. Draper were carried without a dissenting voice.

One obstacle alone was raised, and it was of a friendly nature, demanding a reconsideration of resolutions dealing with the fair wage regulations in government contracts, with the view to reshaping and making airtight the formal expression of the wishes of the congress. The debate was adjourned without decision.

P. M. Draper fathered a popular movement in his attack against the movement aiming to compel labor unions to incorporate. His pleas won the solid support of the congress, which went on record as unconditionally opposed to the principle of incorporation, and secured the pledges of more than 400 delegates to return to their local unions and fight the battle against employers on this issue.

Mr. Draper was again victorious in a challenge to a sub-section of the congress on the subject of the Nova Scotia mine workers' strike. The debate on this question followed receipt of a telegram from Premier Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, in which the premier expressed his sympathy with the request that troops be withdrawn from the coal mine strike areas. The premier further declared that the troops would be withdrawn immediately the authorities which had called them in decided they were not required.

Draper Defends Premier. Delegate Watson, of the miners' union, jumped to his feet and labeled the prime minister's message the "trick of a slick politician." He was sharply taken up by Mr. Draper, who vigorously argued that it was time for organized labor to treat courteous and sympathetic messages from heads of the government with the same spirit in which they were sent.

He further pointed out that the prime minister's hands were more or less tied in the dispute, as he could not dictate to a provincial government on the affairs of a province. The decision of the congress was to send a new message to the premier, thanking him for his support.

Another telegram was sent the premier of Nova Scotia, asking him to state his position on the question of withdrawing the troops immediately from the Glace Bay area.

Discussion of the fair wage question on government contracts, federal and provincial, provoked the longest debate, which was finally adjourned at the conclusion for resumption tomorrow morning. The debate hinges on a demand that a specific resolution be framed which would incorporate labor's insistence that by present regulation and order-in-council providing for the fair wage be embodied in a statute. As it exists at present, in the form of a regulation, contractors have been able to defy the government to enforce it.

Make Attack on Rollo.

Hon. W. R. Rollo, minister of labor of the Province of Ontario, was the target of a sharp volley of criticism from the Ontario delegates on his stand on the enforcement of the provincial fair wage regulation. Delegate Ingles of London told of a visit by representatives of labor to the minister on the question of the new Western University, towards which the province is granting \$800,000.

The delegation had requested the minister to enforce the fair wage clause, but the minister had replied that he had nothing to do with it. He advised the deputation to see the minister of education. Other delegates cited particular cases against Hon. Mr. Rollo, and concluded their general arraignment with a blanket criticism of the attitude of the provincial and federal ministers on the issue.

ANGUS' CONDITION SERIOUS.

MONTREAL, Aug. 22.—F. B. Angus, widely-known Canadian financier, is now suffering from illness caused by advanced age, is reported today to be in a very grave condition. Since yesterday he has grown much weaker and his doctors consider that he will not linger in the present state much longer.

MAGISTRATE OBJECTS TO REPORT OF "HORSEPLAY"

Claims Toronto Account of Windsor Happening Was Greatly Exaggerated.

WINDSOR, Aug. 24.—Exception was taken by Acting Magistrate Ellis in Windsor police court today to a news story appearing in a Toronto paper Wednesday morning, in connection with a case which Magistrate Ellis dismissed the previous day.

The story was with reference to the four Essex women who were charged with attempting to hang Mrs. John Maycock, a 62-year-old neighbor with an 18-inch rope.

Magistrate Ellis openly announced that the Globe's account of the case was inaccurate and far-fetched. "The correspondent who sent that story should be excluded from this court. The story gives the impression that a criminal would have no trouble escaping justice in this court," he said. The account appearing in the Toronto newspapers vividly described several very brutal attempts to hang the aged woman. This was greatly exaggerated, the magistrate said. In dismissing the charges in police court he said that his conclusion was that the episode was merely "horseplay." No harm to the aged lady was meant, he decided.

PRIEST FROM ROME VISITS KITCHENER

Rev. A. W. Weiler Declares Growth of City Remarkable During Twenty Years.

Special to London Advertiser.

KITCHENER, Aug. 24.—Rev. A. W. Weiler, C.R., rector of the Resurrection College at Rome, Italy, has returned to Kitchener after an absence of eighteen years.

In a statement made today, after a brief survey of the city, he declared that he had not been for one or two familiar landmarks which are still standing he would be unable to recognize the city which he left almost twenty years ago.

He stated that the change is one of the most remarkable evidences of a city's progress that he has witnessed in his lifetime. Referring to conditions in Italy he stated that the political situation is too chaotic at the present time for one to make any predictions of a political nature. He said the general trend of political affairs there leads him to believe that the state is facing a revolution, which can only be forestalled by a coalition of political parties against the radical elements. He will remain in Kitchener until about November, when he will return to resume his duties in Rome.

CONTINUE RECORD OF "DIVINE CURES"

Evangelists At Wallaceburg Deny Miraculous Healings Demonstrate Mental Therapy.

WALLACEBURG, Aug. 24.—Evangelists Wallace and McCalden have resumed their faith-healing services here and anticipate holding meetings every day until September 3. These services are being attended not only by local citizens, but also by many from distant points, and miracles are being wrought daily, it is claimed.

On Saturday evening, August 26, a special service will be held for men only.

Disclaims Mind Cure.

Evangelist Wallace today asked that it may be made clear that the results which have been obtained were not mind cures, as suggested by some newspapers, and he wished to emphasize the fact that "divine healing" as per the atonement comes from God, the Father, through the Son, by the Holy Spirit.

"It is not medical treatment, neither faith cure, neither mind cure, neither will power, but comes direct from the blood shed on Calvary to all who believe and obey God," he said.

He also wishes it plainly understood concerning those who have been cured that neither he nor Evangelist McCalden authorize any statement unless they have positive assurance on the ground on which they stand.

Among the recent cures performed is that of Mrs. Sam Dunderdale, wife of a well-known farmer in this district. Mrs. Dunderdale has been an invalid for eight or nine years, and had an operation two years ago for intestinal catarrh. Everything had been done in the medical line to relieve her, and practically all hope had been given up for her recovery.

States She Is Cured.

Evangelist McCalden visited her at her home, and having been anointed and prayed for, Mrs. Dunderdale now positively states that she has been cured.

Mrs. Pearson, a resident of this town, suffering for a length of time from nervous breakdown and internal trouble, has been cured, as also has Mr. Falconer, whose health was in a very precarious state. He is now able to resume his former employment, and states that he never felt better.

Another invalid who had to be wheeled in a chair to the place of meeting was anointed and prayed for, and is now slowly regaining the use of her limbs, it is claimed.

ASQUITH TO WRITE BOOK IN REPLY TO EX-KAISER

LONDON, Aug. 24.—(By Canadian Press Cable.)—Messrs. Cassell, well-known publishers, state that a book in which Rt. Hon. H. H. Asquith, former British premier, is replying to the ex-kaiser's memoirs, will be published next year.

They say they are not at liberty to state what Mr. Asquith is to receive for his book, but intimate that it will not be quite so much as £100,000, which is said to have been promised to Premier Lloyd George for his forthcoming book of memoirs.

STEALS TICKETS TO REACH DESTINATION

Kitchener Youth Allowed To Go On Suspended Sentence.

KITCHENER, Aug. 24.—A Kitchener youth, aged 18, pleaded guilty in police court this morning to stealing tickets from the Grand Trunk ticket office in Waterloo.

He stated that he had accepted a position from the Grand Trunk in Waterloo, and had no means of getting his transportation there. In an effort to steal a ticket he took six, five of which were for Toronto, and one for London.

He was allowed out on suspended sentence on the understanding that he would not be on the streets at night after 8:30 o'clock, and that he would report to the police once a week. He also promised to pay the railroad for the tickets as soon as he earned enough money.
