PROHIBITIONISTS PLANNING CAMPAIGN

ONTARIO'S DRY FORCES PREPARE TO OPPOSE VOTE

General Organization Planned Against Any Referendum in Province.

APPEALING TO POWERS

Canadian Press Despatch.
Toronto, March 11.—General organization in opposition to the submission of either plebiscite or referendum in connection with the present Ontario temperance act is being perfected by the prohibitionists throughout the province, and it is the intention that the culmination of the effort will take place at the general convention and conference called to meet in Massey Hall, Toronto, on Tuesday next.
In the meantime the Ontario government and the members of the legislature have been heavily bombarded with resolutions of various church and other organizations urging that the enforcement of the Ontario temperance act be given a fair trial by the Ferguson government under the direction of Attorney-General Niekke before the question is again submitted to the people.
The mass conference here next Tuesday has been summoned under the name of the "annual convention of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance." R. J. Fleming is the president and J. Bailey acting secretary.
The convention will consist of a committee of 20 persons representative of different organizations and interested after many weeks of careful study has arrived at a basis of agreement, upon which it is sincerely hoped that all persons interested in the prohibition cause will unite.
It is announced that "the present situation in Ontario" will be the subject of discussion and that the situation in provinces where there is now a system of sale of liquor and government control will be outlined by representative speakers.

Yesterday In Ontario's Legislature

Yesterday in the Ontario legislature: Premier Ferguson announced that the government would bring in legislation to stop bonusing of industries by municipalities; to put embargo on export of pulpwood; to tax summer resorts in unorganized territory; to prevent sale of fraudulent stocks; to define different types of hotels and create regulations for them; to further hydro rural extensions.
Bills establishing separate department of health passed, and establishing quarantine for imported bee colonies passed committee.
In discussion of estimates the premier announced that the fiscal year of the University of Toronto would be changed from June 31 to October 31, to conform with other government departments. He also announced that the T. and N. O. Railway would not be built to James Bay. Branch lines were under consideration.
House adjourned at 6 o'clock.

MAYOR EJECTS REPORTER FROM THE CITY HALL

Charges Articles Appear Are Unfounded and Gives Out Warning.

ASKS FAIR CRITICISM

Gently but firmly the Free Press representative at the city hall was ejected from the mayor's office this morning, Mayor Wenige officiating as the guide to the doors.
Later in the morning the mayor again encountered the same representative from the Free Press, this time in the city engineer's office. The order was repeated and the visitor withdrew.
"When we want you, we'll send for you," the mayor explained, "but you should have a good idea by this time that you are not wanted around my office."
Taking exception to certain articles which have been appearing, he states, in the Free Press from time to time, the mayor announced at noon that he would not be responsible for anything in the Free Press credited to him unless followed by his signature.
A resident of East London called the mayor by telephone this morning, asking if it were true that he proposed to suspend practically every city official. The mayor replied that the latest charge was absolutely without foundation.
Mayor Wenige does not mind legitimate and fair criticism, he stated, but he does object to what he terms "articles which have been appearing in the Free Press and which are as far from the truth as the moon is from the sun."

A mild form of la grippe, which in most instances has proven invulnerable to serum inoculations, has been visiting London and vicinity. Local doctors claim the prevalence of gripe this season has reached pronounced proportions, but fortunately it is a relatively mild type.

YOUNG COUPLE HELD ON SERIOUS CHARGE

Remanded For Week Until Case Is Investigated by Authorities.

Living in a local hotel together, Arthur Iutzi, 22, and a young woman, 20, were arrested by police yesterday and remanded a week for investigation in police court this morning.
The young woman, although she gave her age as 20, looked no more than 14. She and Iutzi took a room at the local hotel after registering as man and wife. The young man hailed from Emmet, Mich., and the girl comes from Tavistock. Iutzi pleaded guilty to the charge.
"You have been making the hotel practically a place of prostitution," Magistrate Graydon told Iutzi. "I'll remand you a week for investigation."
Orders were given to get in touch with the girl's people. If her age proves to be 14 or 15, another and more serious charge will likely be laid.
Iutzi had nothing to say other than that he had "got in wrong." The girl, wearing a tan o'shelter and dilapidated red coat, looked like a miserable child as she told her story to a member of a local charitable institution. The couple will spend the next seven days in jail.



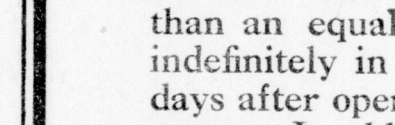
