GIRL TRAINING ROUNDLY SCORED

Miss L. W. Brooking, Toronto, Delivers Interesting Talk at Alliance.

The London Ministerial Alliance heard some very startling facts this morning in the midst of an address delivered by Miss L. W. Brooking, superintendent of the Alexandria Industrial School, Toronto. At the close of Miss Brooking's address a cordial vote of thanks was tendered her on motion of Archdeacon Sage for her "intelligent, useful and inspiring

Miss Brooking began her address by stating that juvenile delinquency and mental deficiency, prior to the war, had been considered so related that it was difficult to decide which was the cause and which was effect. Post-war conditions, however, show that there are more normal sinners on the docket. The Chicago case hows that even brilliant mental individuals may become an anti-social and criminal menace to the country. Moral obliquity is becoming a cast in the eye of the world's youth to ar which seeps through from the highgrade mental defective

In the old days the boy was able to ape the man, but small businesses and small industries have gone out of date and there is not room for the normal boy to play around to normal manhood. Highly specialized inlustries may be god for output but not for the juveniles engaged in industry. The work hours become a torture and then comes the perilous reound toward excitement. There follows in rapid succession, in innumerable instances, wild things about the streets, wine and women and

were 101 industries about the home, there was sufficient to keep the girls occupied and interested, in spinning, house-cleaning, candle making and soap making. But now, who makes soap? It will soon come to be, who house cleans? The girl of today is bound to be nervous, active excited. for we are now in the third genera-tion of girl workers in industry.
