NANAIMO, April 9.—(Special)—Austin Stevenson, an employe of the Hamilton Powder Company, met death this afternoon in a sudden and terrible manner. He was driving a one-horse express wagon containing 400 pounds of nitroglycerine from the company's lower works to the mill, and had taken the Departure Bay road from Northfield. This road is extremely rough in places, and to this fact the awful sequel must be attributed. When Stevenson had covered part of the distance the nitroglycerine exploded with such terrific effect that man and wagon were literally blown into nothingness, while the horse legs being torn from the body, and the latter disemboweled. The ground within a circle of fully fifty yards in diameter looks as if a cyclone had recently struck

it. Trees are torn up by the roots in all directions, and the few houses in the vicinity are badly shaken and their windows shattered into fragments; the small cottage of A. E. Dougan, situated about 200 yards away from the scene of the tragedy sustained the greatest damage in this respect though none of the occu-
