## FARMERS WIN IN CARLETON Candidate Loses His Deposit in By- Election.

Fredericton, Oct. 28.—(Canadian  
Press)—Complete returns from Car-  
leton-Victoria county by-election show  
that Thos. W. Caldwell, United Farm-  
ers' candidate, has a majority of  
3,540. There were 9,702 votes polled  
Caldwell got 6,621 and Lieut.-Col. W.  
W. Melville 3,081, the independent  
Unionist candidate thus losing his de-  
posit.  
By counties the vote was:  
Carleton—Caldwell, 4,662; Melville,  
2,382.  
Victoria—Caldwell, 1,969; Melville,  
1,031.  
Colonel Melville carried only four of  
the polls in the two counties. Three, of  
the four were Woodstock, Perth and  
Andover, where Hon. Arthur Meighen,  
Minister of the Interior, spoke in the  
two days he was in the constituency.  
An analysis of the vote shows that the  
people in the towns voted against the  
farmers candidate very largely, irrespec-  
tive of political affiliations.

## NEW INDUSTRIES FOR CAMPBELLTON Two Large Mills to be Erected Here—Work Begins Monday.

Campbellton is to have two new  
lumber mills, and work is to be com-  
menced at once and the plants in op-  
eration for next season.  
Members of the construction depart-  
ment of the Fraser Companies, Limited,  
arrived here this week and are now  
advertising for men to begin the work  
of erecting two large mills on the B.  
A. Movat property, which the Fraser  
Companies Ltd., acquired some time  
ago.  
Crews are already in the woods cut-  
ting logs for next season's operation.  
One mill will be for the manufac-  
ture of long lumber while the other  
will manufacture cedar shingles.  
The Fraser Companies Ltd., are  
perhaps the largest lumber operators  
in the province. They have plants in  
the following places—Cahoon, Glend-  
yne, Estcourt, in Quebec; Edmundston,  
Baker Brook, Plaster Rock, Frederic-  
ton and Nelson in New Brunswick,  
and now Campbellton is to be includ-  
ed in the chain.  
An office will be opened here short-  
ly, in the meantime Mr. Saunders is  
making his headquarters at the St.  
Louis Hotel.  
The establishing of these two mills  
will mean much to Campbellton. Hun-  
dreds of men will be employed during  
construction and a large number of  
men will be required when the mills  
begin operations.

## VICTORY BOND DRIVE NOW ON Work Commenced Monday Morn- ing—Who Wins Captured German Gun.

The Victory Bond drive throughout  
Canada began in earnest Monday  
morning and already reports are com-  
ing in of large sales of bonds.  
Victory Bonds are a good invest-  
ment and Canadian people are realiz-  
ing this. This will be the last oppor-  
tunity of buying Victory Bonds.  
In Restigouche the drive is only get-  
ting fairly under way. The various  
clubs are preparing their campaign  
and will be out in earnest in a day or

Restigouche has been apportioned  
\$500,000, and this amount should be  
greatly exceeded.

block are a busy place. On Saturday  
a telegram was received from Mr. T.  
H. Estabrooks, Chairman of the N. B.  
Executive, St. John, stating that a  
German field gun was to be presented  
to the county if this province secur-  
ing the highest percentage over the  
amount allotted. This German gun  
was captured by the Canadians and  
would make another historic moun-  
t for Riverview Park. Let us all  
do our utmost to win the coveted  
trophy.

NOW IN HOSPITAL**  
Assaulted Foreigner, Storekeeper and  
Was Shot in Self  
Defence.  
A short time ago the Graphic men-  
tioned the fact that a Douglastown  
man had been shot, but that no be-  
ticulars were available.  
We have learned that the injured  
man, a Mr. Brantley of Douglastown,  
said to be a noted character, is now in  
the hospital here with four bullet  
wounds, as a result of an assault on a  
foreigner, a storekeeper, but he will  
recover.  
A commercial traveller who has  
returned from the coast, stated that  
the injured man went into a store at  
Douglastown and demanded goods.  
Upon being refused until payment was  
forthcoming he proceeded to assault  
the owner, who was beaten, kicked and  
almost made insensible.  
The assaulted man managed to get  
hold of a loaded revolver and fired  
five shots at his antagonist at close  
quarters, four of which took effect.  
The wounded man then left the store,  
drove to his home, and a doctor was  
summoned. After receiving atten-  
tion he was sent to the hospital here,  
and at least one side of the story  
is known.
