

PULPWOOD BAN NOT TO BE APPLIED

Proposal for Repeal of Embargo Likely to Come Up in Parliament.

Ottawa, Sept. 26.—There are evidences that the legislation passed at the last session empowering the Government by order-in-council to place an embargo on the exportation of the pulpwood does not appeal to the rank and file of the party. Some of them who have been here this week talk of proposing its repeal next year, quite irrespective of the findings of the commission of inquiry. The embargo applies to pulpwood cut on crown lands, while the Government has given an understanding that the export from farmers or settlers lands will not be interfered with. The figures indicate a very large increase in exports of the United States. In the five months ended in August the aggregate value was twenty millions, as against twelve millions in the corresponding period last year. Argument is being advanced that restrictions on trade are not in keeping with the party policy, and whatever the commission may report there seems to be lessening probability of the embargo being applied.

Special Agent H. Culligan Handles Case—Suspect Out On \$1000 Bail

As the result of a probe instituted by A. J. Lingley, Superintendent of the Investigation Department of the C. N. R., in connection with the frequent disappearance of baggage along this route of the railway, A. J. Dionne, a baggage master of Quebec has been apprehended and now awaits his trial which will come up for hearing during the month of October. The investigation was inspired by numerous complaints made by people who had lost valuable baggage in transit. Special C. N. R. Agent H. Culligan was assigned to the case. Armed with a search warrant Detective Culligan searched Dionne's residence and there found jewelry belonging to Dr. L. C. Davis, of St. John, who later identified the valuables as being his property. Dionne was apprehended and appeared for hearing when his case was set for trial during October sessions of the Quebec courts. He was allowed bail in the amount of \$1000.
