Young Methodists Make a Stand.
THEIR POSITION IN POLITICS DEFINED BY
Toronto, March 11.—In reply to a communication from the secretary of the Dominion Alliance, the following resolution was adopted at the closing session of the Methodist Young People's Association:—
Resolved, That whereas our last General Conference adopted the following declaration of principles on the temperance question: (1) that the liquor traffic cannot be legalized without sin; (2) that it is the duty of our societies to publicly declare that they will vote only for the candidate who refuses to commit himself publicly to the destruction of the liquor traffic at the earliest possible moment; should have the support of Christian electors.
Therefore, we, the officers and delegates of the Methodist Young People's Association of Ontario and Quebec in convention assembled, heartily endorse the declaration of principles and do hereby declare that they will vote only for the candidate who refuses to commit himself publicly to the destruction of the liquor traffic at the earliest possible moment; should have the support of Christian electors.

Walking Round the World.
Albany, N. Y., Feb. 27.—Mr. C. W. McDade, who is walking round the world, from San Francisco, in a year, for a purpose of \$20,000, called on Governor Mottin this morning. He expects to reach San Francisco on July 10th. He expects to win sixty per cent of the side bets he makes, thus making the stakes \$28,000. He traversed 7,000 miles, and has been in nearly every part of the world. He is sixty-four days ahead of time, and 1,400 miles ahead of his competitor, an Englishman named John, who is now in Illinois.
