

Prime cattle are very scarce in our market, so scarce that several carloads have been brought from Chicago within the past week to supply the wants of our butchers. The cattle in the hands of farmers are, as a rule, of very interior description. In wheat quotations are almost nominal in the almost total absence of transactions. Other grains remain without material change. The provision market remains unchanged. Clin cinnait and Chicago markets have not been quite so active, but the market here remains quite unaffected. Butter is rather scarce. The cold and unscassonable weather, lately provalent, has tended to lessen the quantity made.
