is required, and this, we are confident, will be given. As a commencement 200 copies of the Scriptures have been granted, and Dr. Hall, J. McBean, Esq., and G. M. Evans, Esq., Directors, have been appointed a Committee to take steps to carry out this benevolent and most essential undertaking. It is quite time that some decisive steps should be taken in this direction.

The Ketchum Bequest.—The Joint Committee of the Bible and Tract Societies, appointed some time ago, by the respective Boards of these Societies, to make arrangements for the equitable disbursement of the legacy of the late Jesse Ketchum, Esq., presented their Report. Dr. Green, the unairman of the Committee, stated, that in the performance of the luties assigned them, they found many difficulties. The Report of the Committee was presented and read by J. K. Macdonald, Esq., the Secretary of the Committee. It was a most exhaustive and invaluable document, and was deservedly commended by the Board. Mr. Ketchum contemplated three objects in his will. First. "Gifts to the scholars attending the Day Schools of Toronto." This Trust has been carried out by the Venerable Bishop Richardson, who will continue the undertaking. Second. "Gifts to the scholars attending the Sunday Schools of the City," and the following is the tubulated statement which the Report exhibits:

The amount to the Sabbath Schools is to be appropriated, "as far as circumstances will admit, as prizes or rewards."

A third object is the bestowal of "gift books amongst the scholars attending the Yorkville Public School."

A very gratifying incident of this meeting was the presence of two deeply interested friends of the Bible Society from Winnipeg, the Rev. Geo. Young, Secretary of the Manitoban Branch Society, and Professor Bryce. Mr. Young spoke most encouratingly of the value and efficiency of the exertions of their colporteur—from whom a gratifying report of labours performed would soon reach Toronto. The Committee in Winnipeg had been exceedingly fortunate in procuring the services of one who had proved himself emi-
