The Congress of the South African League Excluded. at its session on the 11th inst. unanimously voted against the introduction of Asiatic labor. Cacil Rhodes emphatically opposed the importation of Chinese into South Africa.

until the operators agree to the con vention's proposition. The terms of the Scranton convention are not ac ceptible to operators and representatives of the coal-carrying companies. The Raading officials do not think the company, while operators are averse to signing a contract binding them to pay 10 per cent. increase until April. No orders have been received as yet from headquartors of any companies instructing superintendents to resume work. Miners say they will not go to work until officially advised by President Mitchell. A convers of the operators of the Wyoming Valley to day shows that their is considerable opposition to granting the miners any more concessions than those outlined in the original offer, namely, 10 per ent incresse without any conditions. The individual operators especially are opposed to tleing themselves up to any agreement. One operator said the only way the strike can be settled is for the strikers to accept the 10 per cent. without any provisions.

More than \$200,000, American 000 will be asked for the support of the army and Navy. and navy for the fiscal and navy for the fiscal year ending June 20, 1902. In accordance with instructions from the Becretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy, the chiefs of the bureaus of the War and Navy Departments have submitted their annual estimates. The chiefs of bureaus of the War Department estimate on the basis of an army of 100,000 men, and Secretary Root, it is thought, will recommend in his ort that the regular army consist of this number, provided Mc-Kinley is elected. If Bryan is elected ar, provided M it is proposed to close up recruiting offices immediately after November 6.

The Moscow corres. Russia and pondent of the London Germany. Standard attaches significance to a speed made by the Russian general in com mand at Wilna to some troops that had been ordered to China, but were reached from Odessa on the very eve of sailing. He says that the general in addressing the men made this ex-planation: "The Czar decided that it was necessary to bring you back to Wilna so that you might be ready here to join us against a foe we shall be ordered to meet." The correspondent adds that the foe hinted at can only bs Germany.

The Times publishes The Chinese Dr. Morrison's mail War. accounts of the events
that led up to the siege of Pekin. He says that the Boxers only became important after the German occupation of Kuacchou. The Chinese were ascribing the dis astrous drought and famine, with other troubles, to the judgment of heaven for the usurpation of the Empress-Dowager. She seized upon the Boxer movement, according to De Morrison, as a means of diverting popular wrath from herself to the foreigners, and appointed Yu Haien, founder of the Boxer seat, to be governor of Shantung, in March, 1899. Thus, under Imperial protection, the Boxers preached the doctrine that it was the foreigners, and not the Em press-Dowager, who had accused the wrath of the Gods. Count Von Walderson has issued an official state ment summarizing the military pro-gress made since he assumed comand. He explains that the seeming mand. He explains that the seeming delay is due to the difficulties experienced in the disembarkation and transportation of the German troops, and also the difficulty of getting the various commanders to work in mony. Count Von Waldersee says the condition is now tolerably satis-factory and that active operations are inaugurated with the Pactingfu ex-

designed to crush the possibility of forther hostilities. Sheng, the Taotsi has received a tolegram from General Su, reporting that a serious rebellion has broken out in the southwestern part of Kwang Si province. He states that his 30,000 troops are inadequate and that he needs at least 100 000 to cope with the danger which is directed against the Manchus and threatens to become worse than the Tai-Ping re-bellion. The Japanese Legation is in receipt of a despatch from the Foreign Office at Tokio containing a report from the Japanese Concul at Tientsin to the effect that the allied forces of Great Britain, France, German and Italy would, on the 12th inst., march upon Pactingfu in three columns, the right under the British commander, the centre under the German and the left under the French, and that the Japanese commander would take charge of the defence of Pekin. The Boxers are in great force east and west of Paotingfu. Chinese official reports state that the Imperial troops defeated the Boxers with heavy loss, but the intelligence gathered fro a the allies and other sources indicate that the Chinese troops were defeated.
