M'GILL ON THE ICE OUTPLAYED QUEEN'S

Played Rugby in Montreal on Dangerous Field Like a Skating Rink.

MONTREAL, Nov. 15.—Playing on a field that represented a skating rink, rather than a Rugby ground, and before about 5000 people, the largest local attendance of the season, McGill yesterday earned the right to play off with Varsity for the intercollegiate championship, thru defeating Queens by the one-sided score of 31 to 8. Never at any stage was there any doubt as to which was the better team. Queens made a gallant effort, but were never able to get within challenging distance of the winners, who forced the pace thru the work of McGill.

The ice-covered surface made it dangerous for the players and added to the difficulty of handling the ball, which was water-soaked shortly after the commencement of the play.
