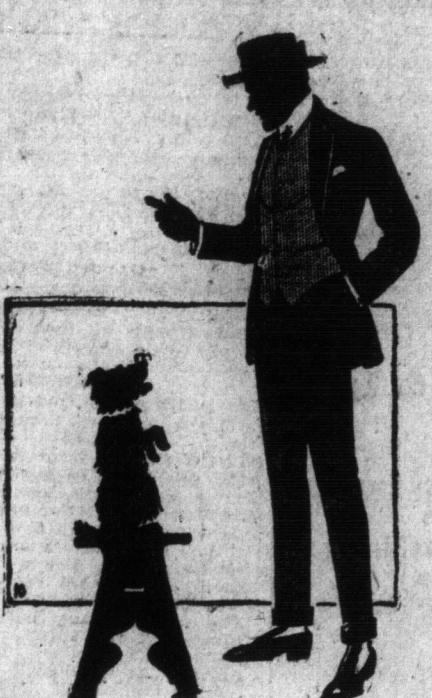

NATIONALS TO HAVE TWO D.L.A. TEAMS?

Two Montreal and Two Toronto Teams in Latest Proposition—Meeting Today.

MONTREAL, April 16.—(Special.)—The Dominion Lacrosse Association will hold a meeting in Mr. Fleming's office in Toronto tomorrow and the lacrosse situation as far as the Big Four is concerned will be defined. The latest proposition has just been put up to the Nationals, and it looks like the one that will be adopted at the meeting. It is suggested that the Nationals run two teams in Montreal and that the Torontos and Tecumsehs fall in line again, leaving the D.L.A. still with four clubs. Torontos are ready and Lawrence Solman, backer of the Tecumsehs, is said to have given his assurance that the Indians will be in favor with this proposition. Some doubt is expressed here as to whether Nationals could afford to carry two teams in the D.L.A. President Carron was in a hopeful mood when he left here tonight for Toronto. Local D.L.A. men are very much opposed to amalgamating with the N.L.U., and it looks like two unions again.

HAGEMAN GETS BONUS.

CINCINNATI, April 16.—The Chicago Nationals were today ordered by the National Baseball Commission to pay to Player K. M. Hageman \$240, the bonus called for in his 1914 contract, and also to submit to the player a contract for 1915 containing the same bonus clause that was contained in his 1914 contract. The Chicago Club contended that as Hageman had come to occupy after 1914 the season was over, they were only indebted to him for half the bonus. The club did not include the bonus clause in his 1915 contract, although his 1914 contract stated that such a clause should be inserted in his 1915 contract.
