that nothing may ftand in the Way of those Arrangements, in your Councils and executive Offices, which may best forward the great, necessary, and bleffed Work of Peace, which may tend to refcue your Affairs from unwife and improvident Management, and which may obtain, improve, and fecure the returning Confidence of all your People : In fuch Measures and fuch Arrangements, for fuch an End, your Citizens of London will never fail to give your Majesty their most affectionate and steady Support.

## His Majefly's Arfwer, delivered the 13th of March, 1778.

I can never think, that the Zeal of my Subjects, the Refources of my Kingdoms, and the Bravery of my Fleets and Armies, can have been unwifely and improvidently exerted, when the Object was to maintain the conftitutional Subordination, which ought to prevail through the feveral Parts of my Dominions, and is effential to the Profperity of the Whole: But I have always lamented the Calamities infeparable from a State of War; and shall most earnestly give all the Efficacy in my Power to those Measures which the Legiflature has adopted, for the Purpole of reftoring, by fome happy, honourable, and permanent Conciliation, the Bleffings of Peace, Commerce, Affection and Confidence, between the Mother Country and the Colonies.
