

British Sportsmen In the Casualty List

London, June 4.—The advance of the Germans on the western front has brought a large number of famous British sportsmen under fire, all branches of sport being represented in the latest casualty list issued. Lieut.-Col. G. E. Hope, killed, was a famous carsman and was awarded his "blue" at Oxford and rowed No. 3 against Cambridge in 1907. He won the university sculls in 1906 and 1909, was in the Christ Church Head of the River eight in 1907-08-09, and the eight which won the Grand Challenge Cup at Henley in 1908. Lieut. J. E. Appleyard, killed, was educated at Alleyn's School, Dulwich, of which he was captain in 1916 and he there held the championship for all-round athletics during 1914 and 1915.
