Transvaal to a British Columbia paper, says:

"I see that several Slocan people are talking of coming here. Don't. Negroes do all the hard work in this ccuntry, while white men act as superintendents, so that a miner is a negro driver, which is a soft job for those who like it.

"Carpenters, masons and mechanics generally have no difficulty in procuring employment. They get from \$125 to \$150 a month, but expenses are very high.

"All plain drinks are two bits, and the


