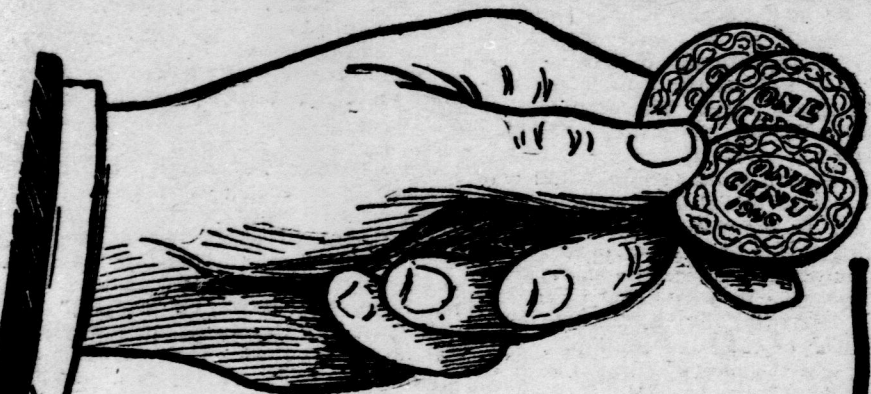

THAT MUTINY IN BRITISH NAVY

Brought About Revocation of the 200-Year-Old-Knee-Order.

London, Nov. 26. — No longer will Lieut. Collard, R. N., or any other officer of the British navy, be able to order seamen or stokers to kneel before him. The 200-year-old order of the knee is to be abolished. This is the result of the recent mutiny of stokers at the naval barracks at Portsmouth.

It was the second mutiny in the history of the British navy, the first being the mutiny at the Nore over a century ago. Then the mutineers' leaders were hanged at the yardarm. Now they are sentenced to five years' hard labor in the penitentiary.

The details of the mutiny, of course, are familiar to readers in Canada. But the secret history of the outbreak shows that the stokers mutinied in order to attract public attention to the brutal German method of treating the men in vogue among several of the officers and notably Lieut. Collard.

At the new year the officers at the barracks were changed. Commodore W. G. Stopford, son of the admiral, was placed in command. With him were a commander and a lieutenant. The latter, a gunner, officer, came into closer touch on his duties with the men than the other officers.

Lieut. Collard is very unpopular with the men. Four years ago he was court-martialed for brutality to a stoker and lost six months' seniority as punishment.

Six months ago, he again got into trouble. One of the stokers on parade was slightly deaf. In consequence he did not obey a trivial order quickly enough. Lieut. Collard ordered the man as a punishment to kneel before him on both knees. The lieutenant shouted, "Down on your knees, you dirty dog," and compelled the man to kneel. Next day the stoker, not being a sworn man as are seamen, employed Lawyer King of Portsmouth, to bring a civil action against Lieut. Collard for damages, charging assault, insult and degradation. The stoker won and secured damages of \$1,000 and costs.

Soon afterward the man was dismissed from the service, ostensibly on account of his deafness. This man was in Portsmouth at the time of the rioting.

A rigorous court of inquiry has been held on the insubordination at Portsmouth. It was secret. Many of the stokers complained of brutality of other officers, but not to such an extent as they complained of Lieut. Collard. The newspapers generally have been bitter in their attacks on this officer. As a result, perhaps, of the lieutenant's naval authorities, Lieut. Collard will send in his papers, but action may be withheld until the mutinous clouds have blown away, when his resignation may be accepted or he may be sent to sea duty off the Gold Coast, or in the Red Sea, and believe it or not, profitless appointments in the navy.

Yet he has been instrumental in having a two-centuries-old obnoxious order abolished and brutal German methods of treating men by officers, forever tabooed.

OLAF WINS BRITONS

Tiny Heir to Norwegian Throne Makes a Hit in England.

London, Nov. 26.—Little Prince Olaf is the hero of the hour.

The gravity with which the blue-eyed little fellow takes himself is exceedingly amusing. Before leaving the Windsor station for London he recognized that the right time to go was away to shake hands with those he left behind, so with perfect seriousness he walked up to the majestic colonel of the First Life Guards and manfully held out a tiny hand. He then turned to the colonel of the Coldstream Guards and shook hands with him.

He next selected the mayor of Windsor for a handshake, and was steadily working his way down the line of railroad officials when Princess Victoria ran up and said it was time to go. Accordingly Prince Olaf trotted off to the royal saloon.

As the train steamed away he got someone to hold him up so that he could wave his hand through the window.

Large crowds assembled to witness the arrival of the royal party in London. The little prince, who was in a carriage with his grandmother, his mother, and Princess Victoria, frequently acknowledged the cheers of the people by gravely raising his hand to his cap.

Prince Olaf's babyishness developed at Buckingham Palace on Thursday, when he was photographed. It had been arranged that he should be taken sitting on Queen Alexandra's knee. But the prince thought the picture would not be complete unless he had some of his toys. He insisted on dragging a greasy wooden elephant in front of the camera. He also provided himself with a toy gun, which he held in true military style, while a photograph was being taken.

To please his little nephew Princess Victoria, at the last moment, consented to make one of the group.

Mrs. H. M. King has bought the Laurels ranch in Texas, embracing 170,000 acres, the consideration being \$1,000,000. The purchase of this ranch makes Mrs. King the owner of 1,280,000 acres, practically in one body. This cattle queen's domain is now nearly twice the area of Rhode Island, and nearly as large as Delaware.

Cheap traveling men who can pick up orders in a brisk and breezy fashion in the west and southwest of the United States, are not the men who may be expected to do business in Mexico, says Consul J. A. LeRoy, of Durango. The professional "hustler" is quite apt to be of no use down there. Men of education and culture, with gentlemanly manners, and knowledge of the language, its people and their customs, are the sort of traveling men American firms need for all Spanish America.

POLISH SCHOOLS PUZZLE GERMANS

Effort to Make Children Learn German Not Pleasing to the Vatican.

Berlin, Nov. 27.—History tells us that in the middle ages a shepherd boy of Southern France, claiming to have received a message from heaven that the holy sepulchre in Jerusalem could only be liberated by the immaculate hands of innocent children, led an enthusiastic band of girls and boys, who had fled from home to the holy land, where they perished miserably or were sold into slavery. One is strongly reminded of this historical reminiscence when reading of the fanaticism of the Polish school children who are engaged in a wild crusade against religious instruction in the German language.

What dangerous direction the strike of the Polish children has taken can be seen from the following affairs, which have happened in various parts of the Posen Province. At a place called Kosten Poles attacked a teacher named Kuban and maltreated him in such a manner that he required the need of a physician. At Kamienie three Polish masons, passing a Catholic school, hearing that the teacher gave religious instruction in German, entered the classroom and demanded of him that he should continue in Polish. When the instructor ordered them to leave, they did not do so, but ridiculed the teacher with the indecent language.

What is more, they personally insulted the teacher and threatened to kill him. Only after the police had been called out did they leave, but later were arrested.

At Schroda, as the children decline to answer in German, the Prussian Government has ordered the employment of four additional teachers. At Hohen-saiz, in many schools, German children are compelled to participate in Polish instruction, and in the village of Schabokowitz and in the city of Gnesen school children have been whipped because they declined to participate in the Polish classes. There are, of course, places where religious instruction is still given in Polish.

The Polish school strike is not only disagreeable, but also most inconvenient to the Prussian Government. It is hardly a diplomatic secret that, owing to the trouble between France and the Vatican, Germany is doing everything possible to curry favor with Rome. Besides, another factor must be considered, the centrum, the party which has the largest representation in the Imperial Parliament, and the Government simply cannot get along without its support. On the other hand, it must be said that the centrum is equally not pleased with the Polish uprising, for already, in Silesia and other provinces with large Polish populations, its representatives have been defeated by democratic Polish leaders like Korynt and others. The Poles, of course, are delighted with the results of their work, and believe it excellent food for their Polish national movement. As the Dziennik Kujawski of Hohen-saiz declares:

"The school strike will be continued. Let the children not fear their teachers or their parents resolve punishment. Behind the Polish children are 20,000,000 of the Polish nation, the Slavonic people and the civilized world."

Some of the leading liberal newspapers, like, for example, the Vossische Zeitung, maintain that the Prussian Government can get out of the Polish mess by abolishing religious instruction entirely in the public schools. It is hardly necessary to say that, in a country where church and state are so intimately connected, this proposition will not be considered seriously.

THE GOSPEL OF WORK

Booker Washington Says It Is Revolutionizing the Black Race.

New York, Nov. 26.—Andrew Carnegie, according to Booker T. Washington, who spoke last night at the Universalist Church of the Divine Paternity, buys his shoes at Tuskegee, Ala., where they are made by colored students.

The speaker said the students in the past year made 2,000,000 bricks. There are, he said, more than 1,500 students, representing 36 states and 12 foreign countries. The value of the institute property, he said, is now \$800,000. It has an endowment of \$1,500,000 for the material increase of which there is an active campaign on hand.

"We are changing the ideal of the black race," declared Dr. Washington. "We are teaching them that labor is honorable, and that idleness is not, and they are recognizing it, too. We have graduated 6,000 students, and they are for the most part sober, industrious, useful men and women."

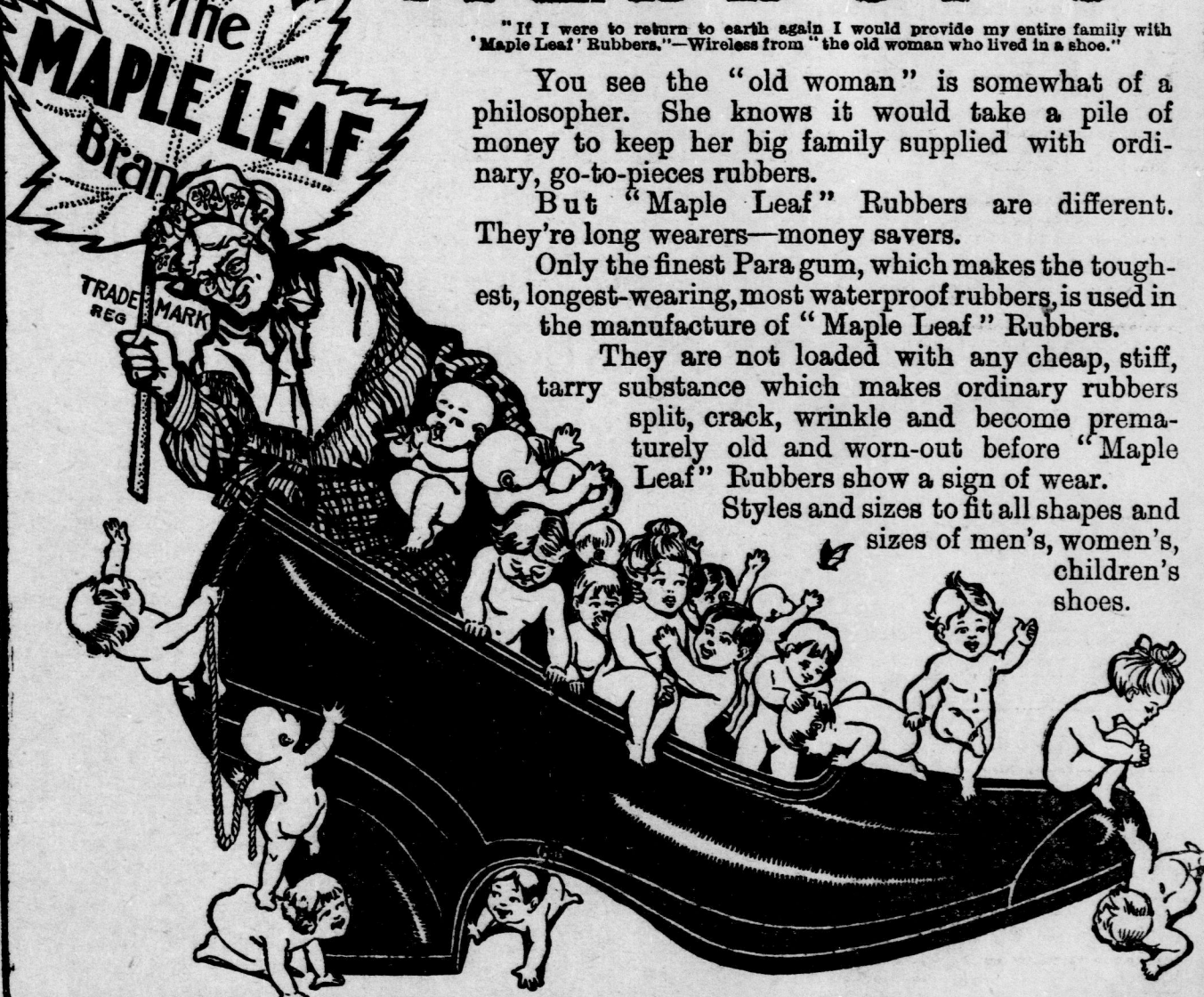
