More Variety, Higher Quality in Entries Than a Year Ago—The Winners.

Galt, May 31.—The sixth annual show of the Galt Horse Show Association opened in Dickson Park this afternoon at 1:30, with a record attendance and splendid weather. The day threatened rain, which, happily, blew over, making an ideal afternoon.

POLICE CANNOT STOP FIGHTING

Mayor McClellan Says New York Authorities Are Powerless to Prevent Bouts.

New York, May 31.—Mayor McClellan today backed up Police Commissioner Bingham in his contention that the police are powerless to stop prize-fighting in this city under the rulings of the magistrates. The mayor said: "When this trouble about prize-fights began the police made arrests. Their prisoners were released by the magistrates who held that no law had been violated. In spite of that the police have continued to make arrests, although the magistrates have regularly refused to hold prisoners arrested on similar occasions. It seems that the police commissioner is powerless to suppress prize-fighting in the absence of a court decision in his favor."

It seemed that all the prize-fighters in New York were at the Jefferson Market court when it opened for business on Wednesday for all the men who fought at Madison Square Garden, including Terry McGovern and Jimmy Bink, the stars of the big bout were on hand. All who took part in the preliminaries, Tim Hurst, the referee, and Harry Pollock, the promoter, were under arrest, charged with prize-fighting.

Bink's two blackened eyes and a cut on his forehead told the story of what he had been through. He shook hands with McGovern and then they were taken up to the bridge. "Why, boys," said the magistrate, "I thought this was for fun?" "Don't we look it?" said Terry. It was then agreed that the hearing should go over.

POCANTICO STAKES.

New York, May 31.—Inquisitor, carrying top weight, 126 pounds, easily won the Pocatonic Stakes at Belmont Park today. He took the lead at the start and made all the pace, winning by one length. First Premium was second, ten lengths before Old Guard, the only other starter. Bill Phillips, in winning the fifth race, equalled the track record of 1:25 2-5 for seven furlongs. Jockey Miller out of five mounts landed three winners and two seconds. Toots Mook, played down from 2 1/4 to 1 to 8 to 5, favorite, finished first, but was disqualified for fouling Lord of the Forest. Inquisitor was the only favorite to win.

Arthur Cummer Goes 1 1-16 Miles in 1:46 1-5—Stakes to Slaughter.
