

CHILDREN OF CANADA MUST ALL BE TAUGHT THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE

Bishop of Qu'Appelle Speaks Strongly
at Diocesan Synod.

REGINA, Sask., May 30.—In charging the 28th synod of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Qu'Appelle, here

yesterday, the Bishop of Qu'Appelle spoke strongly on the questions of language and religious education in the public school as follows:

"Canadians, we shall ever take a deep interest in our common school. What our schools are today our people will be tomorrow. The importance of insisting upon every child being taught to speak the English language cannot be exaggerated. In an immense country like ours, where it is so easy for a foreign community to preserve its identity

and language, and for children to grow up in ignorance of British institutions and customs, it is nothing less than criminal, in the light of passing events, to be indifferent to the education of the children of those who of their own free will and accord have sought and accepted the privileges and responsibilities of British citizenship, and to allow them to continue in ignorance of the English language. Without this language it is quite possible for the children of foreigners to dwell in our midst, and yet live through life in thought and allegiance to a foreign land."

GYPSY SMITH MAKES DEFENCE OF Y. M. C. A.

MONTREAL, May 30.—Speaking in St. James Methodist Church tonight, Gipsy Smith made an impassioned defence of the Y. M. C. A. against recent attacks, and called upon returned soldiers in the congregation, who responded warmly in his favor.

"The best answer to criticism of the Y. M. C. A.," said Gipsy Smith, "was its success. The British Government wanted it; the French Government had taken it; and the Y. M. C. A. might bring the same benefits to the French soldiers."

SEVIGNY IS PULLING WIRES AT CAPITAL FOR A NICE BERTH

Rumor Says He Will Land
With High Commissioner.

REWARD FOR MARTYRDOM

Blondin and Rainville Also
Remain To Be Fixed Up
by "No Patronage."

OTTAWA, May 30.—The Government is being made to provide jobs for three French-Canadian members of the old Borden Government who ran and won so disastrously defeated at the last election. In the case of one in particular, Hon. Albert Seigny, former minister of inland revenue, the matter is urgent, since Mr. Seigny is here himself doing the urging. Mr. Seigny was one of those members of the former Borden cabinet who graduated from the "shoot-holes-in-the-British-Flag" school of the ultra-imperialists. Yet, he even went so far as to start an officers' course at Kingston, but he was never seen in uniform. However, he supported conscription in the last election, whenever he could find anyone to listen to his testimony of conversion. His career was somewhat meteoric, and he was not long in the cabinet. He was successively deputy speaker, speaker, secretary of state and minister of inland revenue, and he moved so rapidly from one to the other that he learned neither well.

Wants His Reward.

Now he is just plain "Mr. Seigny," with a capacity for doing nothing but a "reward" for his faithful public service.

As a feeder, Government newspapers put out a story last session to the effect that he was to be made assistant librarian. The fact, however, that he knew nothing of library work created some protest and the idea was dropped. When the Senate was mentioned, but there aren't any Quebec Senate vacancies at present, and Mr. Seigny is impatient about waiting for dead men's shoes.

So now it has been discovered that there is no French-Canadian representative on the high commissioner's staff in London, England; neither is there a French-Canadian representative for that matter, but that is nothing. Quebec, it is suggested, should be must be represented in the cabinet. And what so apt but that Mr. Seigny, "imperialist" should have the position?

It is stated that he will get it.

Must Care For Blondin.

As for Hon. P. E. Blondin, he is overseas in England and wears a colonel's uniform. He has not been in Canada for more than a year, but he has been minister of the postoffice (by absent treatment) during all that time. He was defeated in two seats at the last election. It is six months ago, and yet he is in the postmaster-general "on leave of absence."

And yet the postmaster-general's job is important in the Government.

As for Jos. Rainville, who lost his deposit, even after having been elected from the County of Iberville, voted in Chamby-Vercheres at the last election, he also is at the capital looking for a reward of his martyrdom and patriotism. He is an inquirer, and depending into these very soldiers' votes, an inquiry which the disclosures of Jos. Archambault in the House rendered it impossible for the Government to refuse. Mr. Rainville's secretary must be cleared before he can be given a position of emolument in the gift of the crown.

ONTARIO MEDICAL ASSOCIATION HOLDS ANNUAL ELECTION

Dr. J. S. Cameron New President—Higher Remuneration of Medical Officers Urged.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

HAMILTON, May 30.—The Ontario Medical Association, one of the associations taking part in the Canadian Medical week held its annual meeting in the Royal Caughnought Hotel this afternoon. Dr. J. P. Morton presided. The following officers were elected: President, Dr. J. S. Cameron; first vice-president, Dr. J. H. Mullen; second vice-president, Dr. F. W. Arthur; honorary treasurer, Dr. Gordon Bates; honorary secretary, Dr. T. R. Routhy; assistant secretary, Dr. F. C. Harrison.

"That in view of the enormous amount of responsibility thrown upon the medical profession in Canada as a result of the war the remuneration of medical officers should be more commensurate with their services," was the principal resolution passed. It was pointed out that stenographers received \$3 per day, while a doctor with the rank of captain got \$6. Toronto was chosen for the 1919 meeting.

ABANDON EULOGIES, IS MINISTER'S REQUEST OF METHODIST CONFERENCE

OTTAWA, May 30.—Stating in emphatic tones that it would haunt him on his dying bed to think that he was going to be "twisted and turned over and patted on the back at the succeeding annual conference," Rev. C. R. Kelly of Catornau appealed to the ministerial members of the annual Methodist conference this morning to abandon the practice of announcing eulogies after the reading of obituaries of ministers deceased during the previous year.

"Men are dying by thousands," he said, "and yet we adhere to the old custom of spending time saying nice sayings." It was all very well for our forefathers fighting together against heavy odds, but it does not belong to the present.

The discussion arose out of the fact that the late Dr. J. E. McVittie of this city left a written request that no eulogy be pronounced after the reading of his obituary. It was finally resolved by the meeting to respect his wish, but to pronounce the eulogy in other cases.

FURNESS LINE STEAMER SUNK; 25 OF CREW LOST

BOSTON, May 30.—News of the sinking of the Furness line steamer Cheviot Range and the loss of 25 of her crew was received here today. The vessel was bound from a port in the Mediterranean to England when she was attacked by a submarine off Fastnet and went down in a few minutes.

The entire crew took to the boats, but only ten men were saved. One of the boats disappeared suddenly and the survivors were deliberately shot and run down by the submarine and all hands left to drown.

Captain J. W. Capning, commander of the freighter, was lost and most of the other officers were among the victims.

WIDE DIFFERENCES IN B. C. SHIPYARD STRIKE

VANCOUVER, May 30.—Little progress was made today in negotiations between the striking shipyard employees and the employers, a wide difference yet being discernible, between the demands of the men and concessions which the employers are willing to grant. Senator Robertson is continuing his conference with both sides.

AMERICAN ARTILLERYMEN BLAST AMMUNITION DUMP

INGERSOLL W. C. T. U. ELECTS NEW OFFICERS

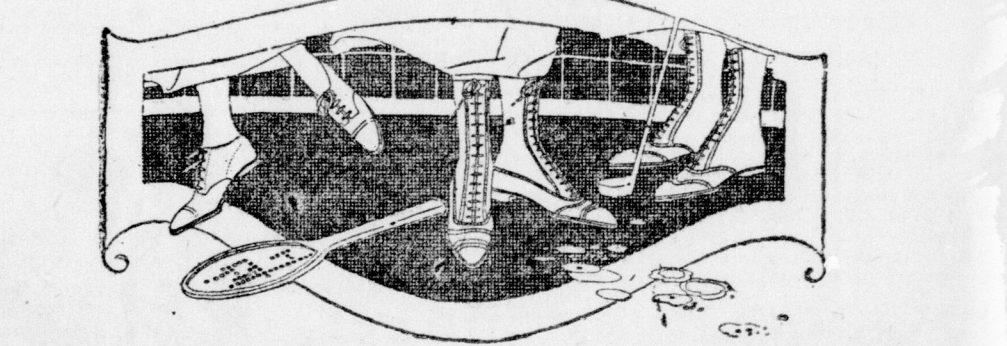
