FURNESS LINE STEAMER SUNK; 25 OF CREW LOST

BOSTON, May 30.—News of the sinking of the Furness line steamer Cheviot Range and the loss of 25 of her crew was received here today. The vessel was bound from a port in the Mediterranean to England when she was attacked by a submarine off Fastnet and went down in a few minutes.

The entire crew took to the boats, but only ten men were saved. One of the boats disappeared suddenly and the survivors believe she was deliberately run down by the submarine and all hands left to drown.


