

WEIRD PRANKS OF STORM BOLT

House Was Wrecked, But the
Inmates Escaped.

FURNITURE WAS DEMOLISHED

Narrow Escape of Family of Hugh Cox
About Two Miles From
Severn.

Severn, Aug. 14.—Rarely has there ever been seen a more unique example of the destructive work of lightning than was exhibited last Saturday at the residence of Mr. Hugh Cox, about two miles from Severn. It was struck about 6 o'clock Saturday morning during a terrific thunderstorm, and is now almost a complete wreck. It is a story and a half building on lot 29 in the 2nd concession of Morris Township, occupied by Mr. Cox, his wife, three sons and one daughter. About one-half of the front and west walls was blown out, eight out of ten windows in the house were destroyed, frames, sash and glass, and the whole building has been so wrenched and twisted that almost every nail has been drawn at least partly from its socket. Doors were thrown upside down, every dish in the house was smashed on the floor, and a more complete ruin can hardly be imagined. With all the destruction, however, the family is safe, and no lives were lost, and not even one of the inmates suffered from a shock. How the people escaped with the current running through every room in the house is beyond comprehension, and can only be set down as one of the unaccountable freaks of the electric fluid.

The entire family was still in bed at the time on account of the heavy rain. Mrs. Cox had arisen at midnight and securely closed every window and door, to which is attributed the force of the shock, as there was no avenue of escape for the electric fluid. The youngest children, Ambrose and Elvey, were sleeping in the front room upstairs, immediately under the gable over the front door. The bolt evidently struck the corrugated tin at the angle of the gable and with holes like metal was perforated, and the like like bullets, it was torn off, together with numerous shingles, and the room below was totally wrecked. The washstand and crockery were thrown over on the bed and the door leading to the hall blown off its hinges. In the rear room slept Mr. and Mrs. Cox, and here happened one of the most peculiar freaks of the storm. The bed was of wood, but each of its four iron casters was snapped in two, the slats containing the springs were also broken, and the mattress sank to the floor with its startled occupant. The bureau and dressing case were thrown over and landed at the foot of the bed with bedroom ware in a heap on the floor. Across the hall slept the boys, but there was little damage done in their room beyond the blowing out of windows and doors and wrenching of the walls out of plumb. The eldest, little sister, who was in the hall, bravely carrying out her brother, who had slept through it all. He stated that when he entered the hall he could not see for the heavy gas and smoke, which possessed all the odor, and attributes of sulphur and brimstone.

Going down stairs, the current struck the living room and created a pandemonium. The dining table was turned exactly upside down, the sideboard thrown on top of it, the lounge was wrong side up, and the debris left by a cyclone. A small china closet off this room had its door broken just in the center, the broken portion being driven inward by the pressure. Every dish on the shelves was thrown to the floor and the family was without means to serve a meal until the neighbors supplied its wants. The electric bolt found the point of least resistance at the southwest corner of the dining-room, and tore a hole here about 15 feet wide each way. An old grandfather's clock stood in this corner and it received the full benefit of the storm. It was torn into a thousand pieces, and its long springs uncoiled and strung all over the yard. The path of the current from the house by a trail of debris of all sorts, and was easily traceable through a potato patch by the light on the leaves, which were turned black. This patch was a lane, where a wire fence was encountered. Whether lightning can be arrested by wire or not is a moot question, but this fence apparently was the only thing that stopped the progress of this current, as there are a number of sharp indentations in the soil by the fence where the electricity was grounded.

A peculiar feature of the affair was the presence of little fire. Flames started in the dining-room, but one of the boys was able to get down safely in time to quench it easily. He also went down cellar, looking for fire, but, on opening the door, found the place so full of gas that he was unable to enter for a number of minutes.

The residence of Mr. Cox has become quite an object of interest to the summer visitors in this vicinity, and large crowds are expected tomorrow.

AUTO-MOTOR MANIA

Hostility and Rules of Swiss React on Hotelkeepers.

Geneva, Aug. 14.—The hotelkeepers of Switzerland are complaining bitterly of the absence of motorists, who appear to be giving the country a wide berth. So ridiculously strict have the motor car regulations been made by the authorities that the owners of cars, who are among the best paying class of visitors, do not care to enter the country. The prejudice of the peasantry against motorists is also another reason for their absence.

Last year Queen Margherita was stoned; Mr. Rockefeller, Jun., was arrested and heavily fined; Mrs. Jay Gould was lashed across the face by a stupid and infuriated peasant near Lucerne, and hundreds of motorists were arrested and heavily fined for exceeding the absurd speed limit of six kilometers (three miles, 1,384 yards) an hour, which is the regulation rate allowed in most towns and villages.

The laws differ also in every canton, and in two of them motorists are prohibited from entering under penalty of having their cars confiscated.

The animosity against motorists which exists is well illustrated by the following incident, which occurred a few days ago. A wealthy Parisian was traveling in the Canton of Schwyz in a forty-horsepower car near the village of Lachen, when the machine skidded and fell in a ditch. No one was injured and the car was not damaged, and half a dozen peasants assisted the owner to return the car to the road, services for which they were handsomely paid.

The surprise of the motorist may be imagined when a gendarme appeared on the scene and arrested him for breaking the law by making the villagers work on Sunday. The Parisian was fined \$4 and costs, and on appealing again lost the case, and was obliged to pay another \$35.

MEDAL PORTRAITS FAD IN ENGLAND

Introduced by a Woman Who
Has Entire Monopoly
of the Art.

London, Aug. 14.—To have one's portrait engraved on a silver medallion is the latest society fad. The craze for miniatures is passing, and in the near future every home of note will have imperishable medallions of its chief members in silver or bronze.

At present this rare and difficult art is practiced by only one woman in England. On the continent, especially in France, portraits in silver, are all the rage.

Chaplain, a Parisian master of the art, has commissions in hand which will occupy him for 25 years, while Roti, who designed the Italian coinage, is booked for ten years. The cost of a well-executed medallion is from \$200 to \$300.

Miss Dora Ohlsson, who has introduced the art here, has had a romantic career. An Australian by birth, she went to Germany to study the piano, and had a nervous breakdown. Going to St. Petersburg later, some artists chanced to see a few caricatures she had done, and advised her to take up art. Accordingly, four and a half years ago she went to the French Academy at Rome and began to study.

"My many artist friends there," she said, "helped me considerably. I worked ten hours a day, and then at night did more study; but I accomplished what I wanted, and now am free to make this medal-engraving my specialty."

First she makes a clay cast, using her fingers for molding and sculptors' tools for the fine lines. The profile only is treated, although, where a child's portrait is produced, it can be given full face.

GUN-RUNNING PLOT ON FINN COAST

Captain of Schooner, Is Held
Prisoner While Rebellious
Crew Lands Arms.

Copenhagen, Aug. 14.—The Danish schooner Peter, commanded by Captain Albertsen, has arrived here after an exciting adventure with Russian revolutionists on the coast of Finland. The Peter was chartered at Lubeck to carry a cargo of iron and copper wires, stowed in large cases, to Lulea, Sweden. Acting on instructions, Captain Albertsen hired a new crew at Lubeck, shipped his cargo and set sail for Lulea.

All went well until the schooner arrived off the Aland Islands, when the crew suddenly mutinied, and, armed with revolvers, attacked the captain, whom they bound and locked in his cabin.

Captain Albertsen remained a prisoner for six days, during which time a sailor armed with a revolver constantly kept guard over him. Through a crack in the wall the captain could see the other members of the crew bringing up cases from the hold and opening them. To the captain's astonishment, they contained rifles and ammunition.

The schooner finally put in at a point on the Finnish coast, where the arms and ammunition were landed by the crew, who had apparently been paid by the revolutionaries at Lubeck. The crew then deserted the schooner. Captain Albertsen was released from his cabin by some Finnish fishermen, who explained that they had been forced, at the point of revolvers, to assist the sailors in landing the contraband.

The captain, who is an old man, hired several of the fishermen and after great difficulties succeeded in bringing the schooner to Copenhagen.

DISS DEBAR OUT OF ENGLISH JAIL

Completes Sentence for Con-
nection With Immoral Cult.

PRIESTESS OF SPIRITUALISM

Wealthy Men Among Victims of the
Adventures and Her Supposed
Occult Powers.

London, Aug. 14.—Ann O'Delia Diss Debar, who, under the name of Laura Jackson, was sentenced on Dec. 20, 1901, to seven years' penal servitude for connection with an immoral cult known as the Theocratic Union, of which her reputed husband, Theodore Jackson, was the head, has been liberated from Aylesbury prison under ticket-of-leave, having obtained the maximum reduction by good behavior.

Mme. Diss Debar has been known under many names in the United States and Great Britain, but her greatest notoriety was achieved as the perpetrator of a so-called spiritualist-deception, by which Luther D. Marsh, of New York, was in his old age stripped of the fortune he had accumulated in the practice of law.

Though claiming to be the daughter of King Louis I. of Bavaria and Lola Montez, she was in fact the daughter of Prof. John C. F. Saloman, once of Washington and later of Kentucky.

She became the wife of Gen. Joseph H. Diss Debar in the seventies, and later traveled about the country representing herself as the personification of occult powers and the revealer of hidden truths, spiritualistic, and other, and in this way, while living in Washington Square, New York, she met Marsh, and by means of alleged painted pictures, so infatuated him and decided to her his home in Madison Avenue. About this time Gen. Diss Debar left the adventures, who went to live at the Marsh home, and also hired apartments where she officiated as a priestess of spiritualism and won greater notoriety.

Suit was brought to show her up as an impostor, and she was charged with conspiring to defraud Marsh. Her trial resulted in her conviction, and she was sentenced to a term of imprisonment. On her release, she went to Europe, then returned to this country, and going to the west, got into more difficulty through her representations of bogus spiritualism. Under the name of Vera P. Ava, she fell into the hands of the Chicago police, who sent her to the penitentiary at Joliet for two years. Released from that institution, she married William J. McGown in 1895 at Chicago. Mr. McGown, like Marsh, was a man of wealth, but this did not deter her from the practice of fraud.

In 1899 she was run out of New Orleans with Theodore Jackson, whose wife she then said she was. A year later they turned up in Cape Town, South Africa, where Mme. Diss Debar called herself Helena. Theodore Jackson called himself Horus. Occultism and hypnotic performances were the order there, and one of her South African dupes, a wealthy contractor, gave his money to the woman to establish a colony of brotherly love. Some time afterwards the pair went to London, where they promoted the Theocratic Union, organizations, scandals in connection with which led to their arrest in September, 1901. The trial, which continued at intervals through three months, developed facts that several of the loathsome papers excluded from their columns all reports of the proceedings in court.

Mr. Justice Bingham summed up strongly against the prisoners, saying it was difficult to conceive of more revolting and abominable conduct than that which had been attributed to them. The jury quickly returned a verdict of guilty, whereupon the justice sentenced Jackson to fifteen years' penal servitude.
